



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

ITEM AND ISSUE:

Request for Approval of the Department of Finance & Administration Certification for Allocation 22-ZG1016-48 in the amount of \$112,500 for Fiscal Year 2024 (Year 2). Also requesting the approval of the BAR for Year 2 of this agreement. The funds are allocated for recruitment and retention stipends for law enforcement officers at Santa Fe Police Department. Ben Valdez, Deputy Chief of Police, bpvaldez@santafenm.gov, 505-955-5040.

BACKGROUND AND SUMMARY:

The City of Santa Fe submitted a request for a disbursement of funds from the Department of Finance and Administration (DFA). DFA was directed by House Bill 68 to establish a program to distribute funds for local law enforcement agencies to provide recruitment and retention stipends to law enforcement officers. The program established by DFA has established criteria for the use of funds and reporting of expenses. These funds are to be used with a priority on recruitment and retention of personnel to increase investigative capacity.

Personnel eligible to receive a distribution include:

- A. Persons who are not certified as a law enforcement officer upon employment by a law enforcement agency, provided they successfully obtain their certification as required pursuant to the Law Enforcement Training Act.
- B. A certified law enforcement officer upon employment with a law enforcement agency, provided they remain with the department for (3) months.
- C. A certified law enforcement officer currently employed by a law enforcement agency, provided they remain employed with the department for one additional year.

This appropriation is distributed over 3 years, for a total allocation of \$281,250.00 to Santa Fe Police Department. Year 1 was approved by the Governing Body and disbursements have been completed. Year 1 was 100% of the allocation of \$112,500, which was disbursed for retention stipends. The entire allocation was expended.

Year 2 allows for 50% of the allocation up to \$112,500 to be disbursed for recruitment and retention stipends. This means the entire \$112,500 of the allocation from the State can be used as long as the City of Santa Fe matches the \$112,500 amount for the stipends.

Fortunately \$272,000 was budgeted for Santa Fe Police in FY24 specifically for retention incentives for sworn positions. This will satisfy the requirement of the allocation to utilize the entire amount allocated by the City of Santa Fe and the State of New Mexico towards our efforts to retain talented staff and fill vacant positions.

The intent of the Department for Year 2 is to issue a retention stipend to all certified law enforcement officers with Santa Fe Police Department who agree to remain with the agency for 1 additional year. Any allocation to members of the Santa Fe Police Officers Association will require negotiations to be opened for the current year contract to determine the disbursement amount of the funds followed by approval of the Collective Bargaining Agreement by the Governing Body.

The certification has a requirement on reporting on the use of the funds to DFA on form "Exhibit A" which is attached to this packet. Any funds not disbursed during this fiscal year will need to be reverted back to DFA.

For Year 3 the Department will be able to utilize 25% up to \$56,250 for recruitment and retention.

ALLOCATION PURPOSE

Two hundred eighty-one thousand two hundred fifty dollars and zero cents over three years to be utilized for recruitment and retention stipends. The second allocations will be disbursed within 5 business days of execution of this agreement.

ALLOCATION DISBURSEMENT

The remaining allocation amount, after receiving the first-year allocation in fiscal year 2023, will be disbursed as follows. The second-year allocated funds will be disbursed up to \$112,500 in fiscal year 2024, and the third-year allocated funds will be disbursed up to \$56,250 in fiscal year 2025. The Allocation Recipient will submit to the Department of Finance & Administration this signed document and evidence of approval of the local governing body. Disbursements of funds will be made within 5 business days of receipt of the signed agreement.

Funds for the second disbursement must be expended by June 30, 2024; and the third disbursement will be made in August 2024 to be expended by June 30, 2025. Any amount not expended in each of the remaining two years will be returned to the State of New Mexico, Department of Finance and Administration in the year that it is scheduled for reversion. All expenditures must occur prior to the reversion date.

The Allocation Recipient agrees to submit quarterly reports using Exhibit A, Law Enforcement Report, providing updates on expenditures for recruitment and retentions stipends.

Please be advised the local government shall follow all local and state licensing and Permitting requirements. **Please be advised that the Ambulance shall comply with NFPA 1900 Standard for Aircraft Rescue and Firefighting Vehicles, Automotive Fire Apparatus, Wildland Fire Apparatus, and Automotive Ambulances, 2024 Edition. Any exceptions made to NFPA requirements will not be approved.**

"This letter shall serve as approval to expend fire protection fund monies to finance the cost of the Ambulance. The City of Santa Fe Fire Department is currently an ISO rating of 2 with a minimum yearly Fire Protection Fund Allocation of \$722,554.00.

If there are any changes in the specifications, or waivers presented at any time during the process, this office must approve the changes. If prior approval and authorization is not obtained from this office, the expenditure shall be rendered null and void.

If you anticipate a loan, I recommend that you contact the New Mexico Finance Authority (NMFA) at 505-984-1454 to finance the Ambulance loan through NMFA will be at minimal interest. This letter shall serve as authorization for you to enter into an agreement with NMFA for the commitment of fire protection fund monies.

A RESOLUTION

**REPEALING RESOLUTION NO. 2007-30 REGARDING NAMING CITY OWNED
PUBLIC SPACES; AND ESTABLISHING A NEW PROCESS FOR NAMING CITY
OWNED PUBLIC SPACES.**

**WHEREAS, the Governing Body adopted Resolution No. 2007-30 which established the
procedures and criteria for naming City owned public spaces including, but not limited to
buildings, parks, plazas, alamedas, facilities and City developed streets; and**

**WHEREAS, the naming process established by Resolution 2007-30 is arduous and time
consuming; and**

**WHEREAS, the Governing Body desires to establish a new process for naming public
spaces.**

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE
CITY OF SANTA FE that Resolution No. 2007-30. is repealed.**

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the following process shall be used for naming
city-owned parks, plazas, alamedas and city developed streets:**

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1. A member or members of the Governing Body may introduce a resolution to name city-owned parks, plazas, alamedas or city developed streets.
2. If the name is after a person, the resolution shall include the following criteria in the resolution:
 - (a) The individual must be deceased; have made significant contributions to the community; and have been a person of high integrity and good moral character.
 - (b) The individual shall be a resident of Santa Fe county or have a strong connection to Northern New Mexico.
 - (3) The individual may have made charitable contributions of time or money either in the past or in the present.
3. If any corresponding donation is attached to the naming, such information shall be provided to Governing Body in the resolution.
4. This resolution does not apply to public streets that are developed and dedicated by the property owner who is not the city. Such street names are subject to the approval of the Planning Commission as set forth in Section 14-9.2(E)(3)(b)(x) SFCC 1987.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the following process shall be used for naming city owned buildings and facilities:

1. Public notice will be sent out to solicit nominations from the community. A nomination letter shall state the reasons for the proposed name and include the nominator's contact information. If the proposed name is in honor of an individual, the letter shall include a one-page biography on the nominee. Members of the public may submit nominations to the city department soliciting the nominations.

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- 2. **The appropriate city committee, commission, task force, board or appropriately-constituted subcommittee shall:**
 - (a) **Meet, discuss and select a name from the nominations using the criteria set forth below.**
 - (b) **If the nomination is the name of an individual, conduct due diligence on the chosen nominee prior to submission to the Governing Body.**
 - (c) **Every effort shall be made to select a name that bears a connection to the building or facility; however, such connections are merely factors and not mandatory criteria.**

- 3. **The nomination shall be submitted by the responsible body to the Governing Body for review and approval.**

- 4. **If the nomination is the name of an individual, the following criteria shall be met:**
 - (a) **The individual must be deceased; have made significant contributions to the community; and have been a person of high integrity and good moral character.**
 - (b) **The individual shall be a resident of Santa Fe county or have a strong connection to Northern New Mexico.**
 - (c) **The individual may have made charitable contributions of time or money either in the past or in the present.**
 - (d) **If any corresponding donation is attached to the nomination, such information shall be provided to Governing Body at the time of submission. The Governing Body shall review the nomination and approve or disapprove the name.**

- 5. **For the purposes of naming library spaces, such as reading rooms, children's rooms and outside spaces, the naming policy established by the library board**





Reason: Because of his good name that he consistently maintained throughout his decades of public service to his second home town, Santa Fe, and the State of New Mexico as New Mexico State Auditor and two-term N.M. State Land Commissioner.

I respectfully would like to put in Nomination the name of my late father, Alex J. Armijo, to be considered for the new name for Santa Fe Fire Station No. 7. I feel he would have been honored to be nominated for his name to grace a Building such as Santa Fe Fire Station No. 7 and therefore my nomination for you to consider his name to be placed on such a respected building filled with fire fighters and fire staff who daily put their own lives in danger to protect and serve us.

My father was born in Santa Rosa, New Mexico on May 1, 1916. He was the second oldest of 10 children. Five of his siblings passed away as small children during the 1919 Spanish flu, two sets of twin girls and one twin brother. He spent his early childhood on his grandfather's ranch riding horses and mastered herding and watching his grandfather's sheep in the evenings and weekends with their sheep dogs. Many of these days and nights during rain and thunder storms and in cold winter weather usually alone. During the Depression, his grandfather lost his ranch, and then his grandfather passed away.

When my father was sixteen years old, his parents passed away, his mother from childbirth and his father six months later from the flu. My father, after seeing his other siblings, including his new born sister given to relatives to raise, he and his older sister with only a few dollars in their pocket came to Santa Fe to find jobs. He was very fortunate to be enrolled in St. Michaels High for his junior year of high school where he worked for tuition and boarding and later graduated. He could not afford college, but because of his wealth of knowledge of math and figures accounting was his chosen profession after high school. He married Stella Delgado, they had three children. At the age of 29 Stella died from Tuberculosis, therefore my father had three young children to raise. My father later married Lucinda Baca, they had three more children. Alex was blessed with a very successful career (see attached resume).

From a 16 year old orphan with only a few dollars in his pocket with only a high school education to holding several distinguished and honorable positions, without ever a taint of scandal to his good name. The Elks Club in honoring him praised him for "never failing to help out anyone, young or old, in need of a job. No one ever left his office without an interview to go for and finding work". As Land Commissioner he felt that he could do more for the schools and children's education through the revenues the Land Office generates for them than any other state office. Nothing was more important than providing our children with excellent educational opportunities. Alex loved his home town of Santa Rosa although he championed and loved his second home town Santa Fe where he lived for 65 of his 81 years.

My father always instilled in us and others that "all we take with us to our grave when we die is our good name, so to never do anything to stain the good name God gave us." His good name, solid good character, honesty and work is why any consideration you can give to this nomination for the name of Alex J. Armijo to grace Fire Station No. 7 will surely be gratefully appreciated by so many people who knew him.

My father was born in November 1944 in Danville, Virginia and is one of eleven children. He graduated from Chatham High School in Chatham, Virginia.

He served in the U.S. Navy from 1965-1969 and was honorably discharged after serving in Vietnam as a Boatswain Mate E5. My father and my mom's brother served together in the Navy and that is how my parents met. When my dad was discharged from the Navy, he came to Santa Fe, NM after proposing to my mom, Martha Bernadette (Berna) Gurule.

My dad 's first day at SFFD was January 4, 1971 as a firefighter. He worked in several positions throughout his SFFD career as listed below:

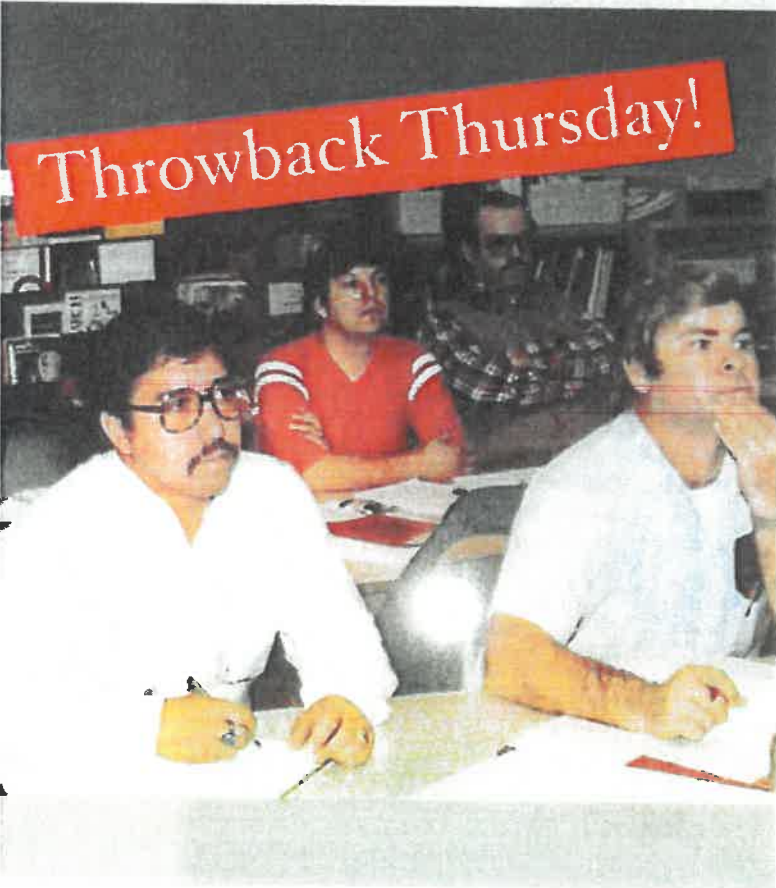
- 1978 Promoted to Lieutenant**
- 1983 Performed training duties for 11 months**
- 1984 Performed paramedic duties on an ambulance**
- 1987 Placed as Lieutenant in charge of a shift supervising 7 stations and four ambulances**

- 1993 Retired after 22 years of service with SFFD**

In addition, to his work at SFFD he also worked part-time at Rio Arriba County Ambulance as a Paramedic and Field Supervisor from 1984 to 1986 when we moved to Santa Cruz, NM in Santa Fe County and was an Espanola Volunteer Firefighter. After his retirement in 1993, he began assisting in the effort to transition the Espanola Volunteer Fire Department to be the paid City of Espanola Fire Department, which it did in 1998.

My dad enjoyed his time at SFFD and as a kid he practiced first aid techniques on me, and my sister. He also showed us how to do CPR while he was preparing for his First Aid/CPR recertifications. He would help individuals study and prepare for their certification tests on his own time, one example of this was with Wendy Wagner who became the first female Paramedic at SFFD. He was always studying for either his EMT or Paramedic as well as firefighting tests and attended classes at the National Fire Academy. My dad worked during the NM Prison riot in February 1980 as a Paramedic. He participated in the Tot Finder advertising campaign. My father even learned certain questions in Spanish so he could ask the injured, what's your name and where does it hurt. He always kept his banjo at the station he worked at and would play Reveille to wake up everyone in the morning.

Even when he was off duty, he took his oath seriously. One evening, when returning from Albuquerque, we were with him and my uncle Leo Gurule who was a Santa Fe County Sheriff, when exiting I-25 to Cerrillos Road, we came upon an accident. My uncle got out of the car to direct traffic and my dad went to check on the occupants of the vehicles involved in the accident to ascertain if they had any injuries and provide care until law enforcement and emergency personnel arrived.

My dad was a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Southwest Pickers Association and New Mexico Instructors Association.

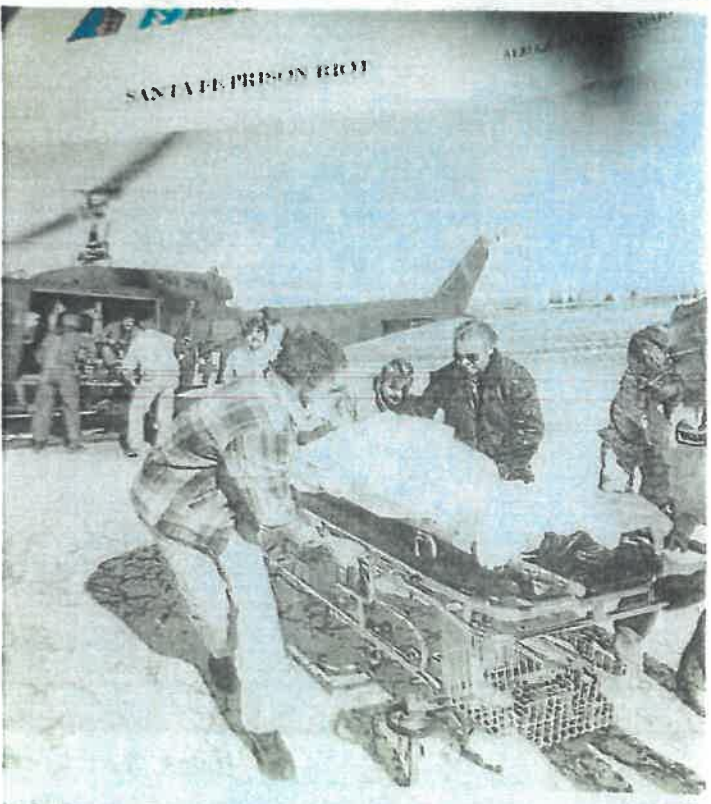

Dear Mr. Moya,

Though my father would have vehemently deferred to the brave men and women of your community as more worthy candidates for the dedication of Santa Fe's Fire Station 7, I am writing to you as his son to nominate Daniel T. Kelly Jr. (known as Bud Kelly) for consideration as the dedicated name of Fire Station 7. I feel his profile as a stellar community guardian makes him an admirable candidate.

My father was a life-long member of the Santa Fe community and in the course of his 99 year-long life, had numerous brushes with fire from the perspective of owner of The Kelly Agency Insurance Company, and having personally lost his office located in Padre Gallegos Building on Washington Avenue to fire along with the entirety of his forest acreage sanctuary in Cow Creek, consumed in the Vivash forest fire in May of 2000. He was personally responsible for providing swift insurance coverage to the Santa Fe Opera after its destruction by fire in 1967 and to the Hansen Lumber Company as well in 1972 after its devastating fire.

A native Santa Fean, my father was recognized as one of Santa Fe's Living Treasures before passing away in August of 2020, served in WWII where he earned the Bronze Star as an aide to General Rollins and later served in Korea in the I Corps Artillery as a Captain, later being promoted as Major. Returning to Santa Fe he worked as president of the family mercantile company Gross, Kelly & Company until its closure in 1954, before starting the Kelly Insurance Agency that built upon his commitment to civic responsibility. He was a founding member of St. Johns College and the Kiva Club Squash Club, president of the School of American Research. He loved New Mexico's history and lore, was comfortable with the broad sweep of demographic diversity, and was fluid with his abilities as community builder and gentleman cowboy.

My grandparents settled in Santa Fe in 1918, and the Kelly family and large extension of other family members since, remain in Santa Fe. I have attached his recent obituary and the Proclamation by Santa Fe County making his birthdate March 22nd, *Daniel T. "Bud" Kelly Jr. Day*.

Santa Fe County Proclamation

PROCLAIMING MARCH 22ND AS "DANIEL T. 'BUD' KELLY JR. DAY"

Introduced by: Commissioner Anna Hansen

WHEREAS, Daniel T. "Bud" Kelly Jr. ("Bud"), was born in Santa Fe on March 22, 1921, to Margaret Gross and Daniel T. Kelly Sr., a prominent and historically significant family that owned and operated Gross Kelly & Company, a pioneering wholesale and retail mercantile company synonymous with the development of the Southwest; and

WHEREAS, as a boy, Bud worked on the Gross Kelly ranches in eastern New Mexico and accompanied his father on business trips where he met merchants and traders along the trails, learned to rope and ride with cowboys who worked on the ranches, and fell in love with New Mexico; and

WHEREAS, Bud built upon his family's legacy and commitment to civic responsibility by not only serving his country in World War II and Korea and graduating from Harvard, but by returning to Santa Fe to help establish and grow many of Santa Fe County's most beloved institutions and organizations; and

WHEREAS, after serving as president of Gross Kelly until it was sold to Kimbell Co., in the mid-1950s; Bud partnered with Howell Ernest Insurance Company, acquired full ownership of the company in 1965 and remained at the helm of the Kelly Insurance Co. until his retirement in the early 1980s; and

WHEREAS, his work brought him into contact with local luminaries and icons with whom he formed lasting friendships, including: Ernie Blake of Taos Ski Valley, John Crosby of the Santa Fe Opera, the painter Georgia O'Keefe, Compound restaurant owner Bill Hooton and designer Alexander Girard; and

WHEREAS, he was an active member of the Santa Fe business community, serving as a founding board member for St. John's College, Santa Fe Preparatory School, and the Santa Fe Opera; director of the First National Bank and president of the School of American Research (SAR); and

WHEREAS, an early supporter of the Santa Fe Opera, Bud is still remembered for presenting an insurance check for \$130,000 within hours of the fire that destroyed the opera house in 1967, and the money enabled the opera to continue that year's season in the gym of the old Santa Fe High School campus, which now serves as City Hall; and

WHEREAS, Bud's longtime friend Nancy Wirth said: "Bud was certainly involved in the establishment of and support for a whole slew of local organizations. He was in there slugging for what were then new groups, and thus he played an important role in shaping Santa Fe"; and

WHEREAS, Bud's civic contributions earned him recognition as a Santa Fe Living Treasure in 2005; and

WHEREAS, his love of the outdoors led to his passionate participation in the Pajarito Walking Group, Santa Fe Winter Ski Club, the Kiva Squash Club, and the Santa Fe Chile and Marching Society; and



WHEREAS, Bud authored "The Buffalo Tail," an autobiography that built upon his father's book, "The Buffalo Head," and conveys his knowledge and memory of the great and formative events of the 20th century; and

WHEREAS, Bud could be found throughout the year tending to his 128-acre tract in the Santa Fe National Forest and people in Santa Fe would easily recognize him on the street with his Stetson Open Road, a Brooks Brothers tweed jacket, button down shirt accented by an ascot, wool slacks, cowboy boots, and in later years, a cane; and

WHEREAS, Bud married Jeanne Wise, a native New Yorker, in the mid-1950s, and together they had four children: Susan, Thomas, Robert, and Pamela; and

WHEREAS, his family and loved ones describe him as: "the embodiment of the great sweep of New Mexico history and lore, a gentleman cowboy, and community builder"; "simply and profoundly human: he had a passionate curiosity mixed with a fiery temper"; "a devout man and incessant flirt"; and "a fastidious man who lacked attachments to material things"; and


WHEREAS, Bud passed away on August 18, 2020, at age 99; and

WHEREAS, the Santa Fe County Board of County Commissioners wishes to honor Bud on the occasion of what would have been his 100th birthday for his service to our country and Santa Fe County by his example, and his indelible impact on the County and its citizens.



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DANIEL T. BUD KELLY JR. Daniel T. "Bud" Kelly Jr, a luminous man with a prodigious historical memory who was recognized as one of Santa Fe's Living Treasures, passed away on August 18, 2020 at age 99. Bud was a native Santa Fean, born to a prominent and historically significant family, who in turn built upon that legacy and commitment to civic responsibility in his own right by not only serving his country in WWII and Korea but by returning to Santa Fe to help establish and grow many of the city's newer institutions. Over time, Bud saw and experienced most of the great and formative events of the 20th century. His knowledge and memory of that time, and of the stories he tells of the people met and of the friendships formed, either directly or through his book, *The Buffalo Tail*, a counterpart to his father's book, *The Buffalo Head*, are the reasons why he

became and remains legendary. Bud was the son of Margaret Gross and Daniel T. Kelly, Sr, president of Gross, Kelly & Company, a pioneering wholesale and retail mercantile company synonymous with the development of the Southwest, which first arrived on the scene in Las Vegas, New Mexico, in 1879 and later opened its Santa Fe branch in 1919 in the building which still stands in the Railyard. The company operated ranches throughout New Mexico, including a 40,000-acre cattle ranch straddling San Miguel and Guadalupe Counties. It was growing up in that country, accompanying his father on business trips, that Bud fell in love with New Mexico, meeting merchants and traders and learning to rope and ride from cowboys working the ranches. Traversing the state, Bud grew to have an expanded and intimate knowledge of the landscape and the peoples who lived within it. He would also, in due course, come to learn the business side of things, involved as Gross Kelly was with trading posts and the wool and timber industry. Margaret was no less a formative presence in Bud's life than was Daniel, as she ensured her son and siblings had proper religious training and cultural exposure. It was, in fact, through gatherings at her and Daniel's home that Bud was first introduced to many of the local luminaries of the time; Oliver LaFarge, Witter Bynner, Peggy Pond Church, John Gaw Meem, Mable Dodge Luhan, and Will Shuster. This breath of exposure, and Bud's eye for detail and inquiry, were key ingredients to his unique character. And of course, his siblings - and the adventures within which they engaged, which ranged from raising chickens to jumping on a horse kept at the house to ride up into the mountains - ensured there was never a dull moment in his life. Bud would take advantage of his early exposure to freedom to spend his adolescence alone or with friends exploring a good bit of northern New Mexico on horseback, riding freely through the Pecos wilderness and spending summers in Canjilon, Rio de la Casa near Mora, and the Sanguilla Ranch at Sapello. And upon returning home, he never failed his

social training that ultimately made him so engaging, whether at a family gathering, fiesta party, or upon a first meeting. Schooling took Bud away from Santa Fe, first when being sent to Portsmouth Priory in Rhode Island at age 13 for five years and then when he subsequently enrolled at Harvard where he graduated in 1943. Then, came WWII. Commissioned as a Second Lieutenant in the Army Field artillery, he was assigned to the Anti-submarine Command in Brittany, France. There he earned a Bronze Star as an aide to Brigadier General Francis Rollins. After the war, he worked for General Mark Clark at the Quadripartite Council Meetings in Vienna for a year. Bud saw both the dark side of war when battles brought casualties and the more glamorous side of military life when as an aide he often stood in for the generals during meetings and social events. Each filled him with stories he would tell across his lifetime: of losing most his unit to a torpedo when crossing the Channel, of collecting money and heading out across unsecured territory to chase down liquor for his comrades, or dancing in glorious ballrooms dressed in formal attire. Bud returned to Santa Fe in 1948, after he received his MBA at Harvard, to work in the family business. But it was not long before war called again, this time in Korea. Bud was assigned to the I Corps Artillery as a Captain, later being promoted to Major. Following the war Bud again returned to Santa Fe, working as president of Gross Kelly until it was sold to Kimbell Co., in 1954. The liquidation of Gross Kelly coincided with his marriage to Jeanne Wise from New York, a beautiful and cultured woman whose father ran a publishing house, forging a bridge once again with the East Coast. Bud and Jeanne had four children; Susan, Thomas, Robert, and Pamela. Coming home, starting a family, Bud also engaged in a new business enterprise when he partnered with the Howell Ernest Insurance Company in 1957. Acquiring full ownership in 1965, Bud would remain at the helm of the Kelly Agency until his retirement. Over time, his work brought him again into contact with local luminaries and icons with whom he formed

lasting friendships: Ernie Blake of Taos Ski Valley, John Crosby of the Santa Fe Opera, the painter Georgia O'Keefe, Compound restaurant owner Bill Hooton and designer Alexander Girard, to name but a few. But Bud's commitment to Santa Fe was not limited to work. Again, we return to his father and mother's teaching and training. Bud became an active member of the Santa Fe business community, and he became a founding board member for St. John's College, Santa Fe Preparatory School, and the Santa Fe Opera. He was also a director of the First National Bank and president of the School of American Research (SAR). His love of the outdoors led to his passionate participation in the Pajarito Walking Group, Santa Fe Winter Ski Club, his beloved Kiva Squash Club, and, more recently, the Santa Fe Chile and Marching Society. Bud could also be found throughout the year tending to his 128-acre tract in the Santa Fe National Forest. It was often said, "Bud was raking the forest." It was his sanctuary. Bud was a man for all seasons, who people in Santa Fe would immediately recognize on the street with his Stetson Open Road, a Brooks Brothers tweed jacket, button down shirt accented by an ascot, wool slacks, cowboy boots, and in later years a cane. He was the embodiment of the great sweep of New Mexico history and lore, a gentleman cowboy, and community builder. He was also simply and profoundly human: he had a passionate curiosity mixed with a fiery temper, he was a devout man and incessant flirt, he was a fastidious man who lacked attachments to material things. It was that mix, of those contradictions, which made him the fully formed character he was. Son to Daniel and Margaret, father to sons and daughters and husband to Jeanne, and spirit to friends and the generations that follow, Bud Kelly honored his family heritage and left a lasting legacy for all of Santa Fe. Bud is survived by his daughter Susan, her husband Christy, their son Tim, daughter Caroline, and Christy's daughter Lauren and her husband, Jon; by his son Thomas, his wife Carroll, and their sons Liam and Galen; by his son Robert, his partner Shirine, and her daughters Tara

and Maya; and by his daughter Pamela and her husband William. In lieu of flowers, donations may be made in Bud's honor to the Santa Fe Conservation Trust and/or the Carmelite Monastery. Dear Fire Department Chief Moya:

My name is Scott Grant Jaquith and I am nominating Dr. Jesse Logan Nusbaum for consideration for naming Fire Station No. 7 on Richards Avenue.

Dr. Jesse Logan Nusbaum was a longtime Santa Fe resident, archaeologist, photographer, craftsman, and builder. Dr. Nusbaum came to Santa Fe in 1907 after receiving his degree in manual arts at the Colorado State Normal School (now the University of Northern Colorado) in Greeley, Colorado.

Jesse Nusbaum's first assignment upon graduation was teaching at the New Mexico Normal School in Las Vegas, New Mexico. There he met, and was employed by, anthropologist Dr. Edgar Lee Hewett in 1907 as a photographer and assistant archaeologist at the newly designated Mesa Verde National Park. After his work at Mesa Verde National Park, Jesse was employed by Dr. Hewett at the Frijoles Canyon excavations conducted by the School for American Archaeology, excavating and stabilizing the archaeological sites in present-day Bandelier National Monument. Jesse Nusbaum went on to perform archaeological surveys, excavations, and stabilization and restoration work in New Mexico, Colorado, Utah, Mexico, and Guatemala.

Dr. Nusbaum's greatest building achievements took place in Santa Fe after his archaeological work was completed when he was assigned the task of restoring the Palace of the Governors in 1909; he would later go on to construct the Museum of New Mexico's Museum of Fine Arts in Santa Fe, the *Painted Desert* exhibit at the California-Panama Exposition in San Diego, and perform restoration work at both Balcony House in Mesa Verde National Park and the mission church at Pecos Pueblo.

Jesse's work as an archaeologist and builder was temporarily halted upon his enlistment in World War 1 where he was stationed as a combat engineer for the American Expeditionary Forces in France. Dr. Nusbaum was discharged in April of 1919 and returned to the United States.

Dr. Nusbaum was named Park Superintendent of Mesa Verde National Park in 1921, a post he held until 1946, where he instituted a distinctly professional approach to the park's management

and interpretation through ranger-led tours of the archaeological sites and the discontinuation of grazing within park boundaries. During the Great Depression, Jesse Nusbaum was also given the task of overseeing the New Deal's Public Works of Art Project in New Mexico where he employed out-of-work artists in decorating non-federal public buildings.

After his employment at Mesa Verde National Park, Dr. Nusbaum was appointed Senior Archaeologist for the National Park Service in 1946. In this role, Dr. Nusbaum worked with the El Paso Natural Gas Company to allow archaeologists to survey and monitor during the company's pipeline construction, setting the stage for the field of "salvage" archaeology. Dr. Nusbaum retired from the National Park Service in 1957, at the age of 71. He continued to live in Santa Fe after his retirement with his wife, Rosemary, and assisted with ongoing archaeological projects and authored books on the same subject and contributed to professional journals and publications.

Dr. Jesse Logan Nusbaum died on December 21st, 1975, at the age of 88, and is buried in the Santa Fe National Cemetery. In addition to his professional achievements, Jesse Nusbaum was a longtime Freemason and a 50-year member of Montezuma Lodge No. 1, AF&AM and the Santa Fe Scottish Rite.

It is with distinct pleasure, then, to nominate Dr. Jesse Logan Nusbaum for his significant contributions to the art and architecture of Santa Fe and his professional achievements in archaeology and anthropology. Dr. Nusbaum's legacy is still being enjoyed by countless residents and visitors to Santa Fe and his immeasurable contributions to the history, art, and culture of Santa Fe through his tireless efforts over six decades in The City Different.

I would like to officially nominate my father Edward "Gonzo" Gonzales for consideration in the naming of Fire Station 7 in Santa Fe. My father was born in Santa Fe and lived his entire life on the same family property at 219 Delgado Street. My father passed away at 87 years old on October 31st, 2022, at home.

If anyone contributed charitably to Santa Fe it would be my father. He gave his time, energy, and influence unselfishly all his life. Starting from my most early remembrance as our Cub Scout pack leader at Saint Francis Elementary school, my father was always helping, he ran the food booth at the parish school bazaar for many years, and also at St Mikes as well. Dad always told us he was heavily influenced by his mother and father to contribute to the community, and to support and nurture the unique Spanish culture of Santa Fe. My grandmother Elizabeth Gonzales was Secretary of State in 1935 when my father was born. My grandfather Leopoldo Gonzales was a Santa Fe city Councilman, so serving the community was in his blood.

My father was a Santa Fe City Councilman, he was first appointed by Mayor Joe Valdez and then elected for a four year term in the mid 70's. He was the President of the Guadalupe Historic Foundation, and was instrumental in the preservation and restoration of the original Guadalupe Church, where he and mom were married in 1959. He was also Chairman of the Board of Rancho de las Golondrinas. Mom and dad have been life long members of Saint Francis Basilica.

I could go on and on about how important Santa Fe was to my father and how he truly was an example of someone who gave of himself unselfishly to the betterment of his community. He knew everyone in town it seemed and trips to the store or walks in the neighborhood resulted in extended visits because he always took time to chat with friends. The New Mexican often contacted my father because he had extensive knowledge and records of events and history pertaining to Santa Fe.

My father was known by "Gonzo", he acquired that name as a paper boy in his youth, and it stuck with him his entire life. My dad was fun, outgoing, friendly, and I don't think there was anyone he met that didn't like him. I could not think of a better way to honor a person who gave so unselfishly of himself for the community he loved so much.

Frank was “family” to me from early 1987 until his death and his wife Janet is my dear sister-in-law, so we go back a long ways.

Frank’s even-keeled and informed stewardship at the Fire Department earned him the respect and love from myriad people, inside and outside of Santa Fe City government.

Frank served as the City of Santa Fe Fire Chief from 1994-2000 and was pivotal in enacting the NM Statute 52-3-1. This legislation recognized that a number of occupational diseases were suffered by firefighters and ensured that their treatment would be covered by Workman’s Compensation.

I am also reminded that he established the Fire Science Program at Santa Fe Community College, and was a United Way Director. He stood up for himself and his views, but he served selflessly—a real role model for public service.

Frank was a longtime resident of Santa Fe and was married to Janet Pate DiLuzio, my sister-in-law. He had two daughters - Heather and Talia - and their beautiful children shine!

Because I was the Nurse Manager of the Critical Care Units at Saint Vincent Hospital for a number of years, I also witnessed his

hands-on service to those in medical distress when he was part of the EMT team.

Frank was such a great guy, and much loved by those whose lives he touched. And his work goes on—as I've mentioned above.

I believe that naming a fire station after Frank would be an appropriate way to honor his leadership and his dedicated contributions to the Fire Department, to the City of Santa Fe and all its residents.

In 2003, Frank joined the board of St. Vincent Hospital and served two terms. He was instrumental in the implementation of the Santa Fe United Way's 211 Info-Helpline and served as Vice President of Community Impact, a position he held for several years.

I was privileged to know Frank, both personally and professionally, for over twenty years. He fought a valiant battle with cancer, but he continued to serve his community all the while.

In sum, Frank Di Luzio was a man of great moral conscience and character who cared deeply for his community and unfailingly committed that care to action throughout his life. He was my trusted friend, but more than that, he was a trusted friend of all of Santa Fe.

His name belongs on Fire Station 7.

Hello Chief Moya -

I would like to nominate Frank DiLuzio as a very worthy candidate to have the fire station named in his honor.

I was a medical doctor for 35 plus years at Christus St Vincent Hospital. I am now retired, but spent my time as a surgical and clinical pathologist, focusing primarily on the diagnosis of disease. For many years I served as president of my medical group, Santa Fe Pathology Services. I was involved in Frank's original diagnosis many years ago. It was a very serious diagnosis, and showed many microscopic features of an aggressive malignancy. It was grim, for Frank and all of us who knew him.

I had gotten to know Frank through my wife, who was very good friends with Frank's wife Janet. We enjoyed socializing with Frank and Janet for many years, both before and after his diagnosis. We have many fond memories of delightful evenings with them, with lots of laughs and good cheer. And also through the dark days when he was undergoing very challenging bouts of chemotherapy, which made him so very sick. He lost all his hair, at least once, and we knew he felt miserable. I still am somewhat in awe of the fact that I never once heard him complain - never, ever! I remember once thinking about how he never said a word about how rotten he surely felt, and thinking to myself, "This is a guy who ran INTO burning buildings when everyone else was running to get OUT. What did I expect, anyway?" He was perhaps the most even-keeled individual I have ever known.

Of course he knew full well what was going on - that he had a very aggressive lymphoma which had a generally dismal prognosis, with few effective treatment options. One of the few things in his favor, was that there was one place in the country that had developed the very best treatment protocols available, in Omaha, Nebraska. He and Janet made several trips there and remarkably, Frank had several bouts of remission, where evidence of the tumor could not be found. Still, Frank was in somewhat uncharted waters as far as complete remission and long term survival were concerned. If I had been told, at the time of his original diagnosis, that he would make it another 10 years, give or take, I would not have thought that possible. I think one of the reasons he made it as long as he did was his remarkable quiet courage and strength of will. He was not a big talker, and I must say that it took a few years before I learned of some of his outstanding accomplishments. He was the last guy to toot his own horn, so to speak. But I know back in the 90's, he served as fire chief for the City of Santa Fe, and worked extensively with the training of emergency medical techs and young fire-fighters. He also volunteered his time as a member of the Christus St Vincent Hospital Board, with whom I worked regularly from 2015 to 2020 or so. Even during the years after his diagnosis, and even when he was not feeling all that great, he volunteered regularly at Kitchen Angels, and I remember his modest grin when he told us, in his quiet way, that he had been promoted to cook, as opposed to just delivery guy and vegetable peeler. We had some great laughs together.

Sadly, Frank no longer walks among us. There is some gentle irony in the fact that, as I think about it, I strongly suspect Frank would be the very last guy who would lobby to have the Fire Station named after him. He would have none of it, I am pretty sure. The thing is though, that Frank left a legacy of quiet competence, courage, professionalism, and integrity, such that his many friends, colleagues, trainees, and family, would see the naming of the station in his honor as a most fitting and appropriate tribute.

At his Last Call Service down by Fort Marcy (one of the most moving memorial tributes I have ever had the duty and honor to attend), we heard from many of his former colleagues, and I learned even more about the esteem and respect he had quietly earned over the years. At the service, Mayor Webber eloquently spoke of how he had heard so many "firsts" associated with Frank's tenure as a fire chief, mentor, and counselor, and when it came to the issue of naming a fire station in his honor, the Mayor said "Let's get this done." I heartily and enthusiastically agree.

Following his time as Fire Chief he spent a year as city manager for the City of Santa Fe. He continued to work in service-based jobs after leaving his position as city manager, working with United Way and Children, Youth, and Family Services among others. After developing occupational related non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma, he continued to volunteer with the Kitchen Angels program, something he was particularly passionate about.

Born in Los Alamos, Frank DiLuzio grew up in New Mexico, Washington DC, and Las Vegas, Nevada. Wanting to return to his New Mexican roots, he moved to Santa Fe after high school, becoming an EMT in 1974. At that time, he joined New Mexico Search and Rescue. Frank graduated from the University of New Mexico's Paramedic program in 1976.

Frank was hired in 1979 as the City of Santa Fe Fire Department's first paramedic after previously working for Albuquerque and Rio Arriba County. The department had two used ambulances and three EMTs in total to cover all of Santa Fe County. There were no cardiac monitors. Frank concurrently was assigned to coordinate the department's Emergency Medical Services program. As their only EMT instructor, he provided all medical training so that almost all firefighters became EMTs. Frank served as the liaison with the State EMS Bureau, UNM-EMS Academy, St. Vincent Hospital, and others.

In 1980, he also began teaching EMT classes at the University of New Mexico EMS Academy and Basic Life Support (CPR) classes to the community. The following year he enrolled at the National Fire Academy in Emmitsburg, Maryland, taking various classes annually. In 1984 Frank became a Lieutenant (currently a Shift Commander).

He graduated from the College of Santa Fe in 1984 with a Bachelor of Arts in Public Administration. His objective was ultimately to become Fire Chief for the City of Santa Fe.

In 1987, Frank was named as the first Captain of Emergency Medical Services. He continued to teach and develop medical training programs while remaining a liaison. During his career he taught Prehospital Trauma Life Support and Advanced Cardiac Life Support (ACLS) to the department and St. Vincent Hospital nurses and physicians.

Frank became the Division Chief of Emergency Services in 1989. He designed and implemented quality assurance reviews, contracts for medical direction and pharmacy services, and maintained daily operations for the city's emergency services delivery system. He initiated a major restructuring of the department's EMS; for the first time every ambulance was an Advance Life Support unit with a paramedic on every call.

Frank served for four years as the Deputy Fire Chief starting in 1990. He was responsible for operations in Fire Prevention, arson investigations, reviewing building plans for code enforcement, and public education. That same year he graduated from the National Fire Academy's Executive Fire Officer Program.

Frank accepted the job of Fire Chief in January 1994 and served in this position for six years.

In January 2000 he was appointed as Santa Fe City Manager, the first person from the public safety sector to hold that position. Frank retired from the City of Santa Fe in August 2001 after almost 23 years. He continued in public service and began working

for FEMA in the Federal Office of Cerro Grande Fire Claims. Two years later Frank became the Vice President for Community Investment at United Way of Santa Fe County for four years.

Frank helped enact the new law in New Mexico for Workman's Compensation to cover treatment for firefighters with specific occupational diseases. He became the first New Mexico firefighter to use the law when he was diagnosed several years later.

Frank was a Board Member on the National Society of Executive Fire Officers, NM PERA, and Santa Fe Crime Stoppers. He was Chair of the Santa Fe Emergency Services Advisory Board; 16 Santa Fe area agencies coordinating training and other EMS issues. Frank served on the St. Vincent Hospital Board of Directors from 2003 to 2011.

Frank volunteered with the Firefighter Cancer Support Network and Kitchen Angels. He was a member of the International Association of Fire Chiefs, the National Fire Protection Association, and the American Society for Public Administration.

Frank donated to St. Vincent Regional Medical Center, local animal shelters, The Food Depot, La Familia Medical Center, Kitchen Angels, and numerous other local nonprofits throughout his life.

Frank was proud that his daughters, Heather and Talia, were raised and educated in New Mexico. Frank and Janet were married 32 years. Frank died in June 2021 after living for over nine years with a rare occupational-related cancer.

Dear Mr. Wolff,

I wish to take this opportunity to nominate Frank DiLuzio for the **Robert Sabin Memorial Award**. Chief DiLuzio's unflagging efforts have spread their fingers not only locally, but far across New Mexico. He has diligently fulfilled health care needs while at the same time maintaining an unyielding pursuit for excellence in EMS. In order to appreciate his vast accomplishments some historical background is required.

In December of 1978 Santa Fe's private ambulance service was pressured to comply with minimum standards. Instead, they chose to suddenly discontinue their emergency response. On a moment's notice, the fire department was forced to adopt this service. At the time, the Santa Fe Fire Department had three EMTs (all basics) and two used ambulances. The department supplemented its EMS response by utilizing uncertified volunteers as field providers.

In March, 1979, Mr. DiLuzio joined the SFFD as its first paramedic; at the time, they had not a single cardiac monitor. Several years later, with DiLuzio's assistance, the department initiated part-time ALS and began to train firefighters as paramedics. Then, as the EMS act was created, the volunteer medical group was at last disbanded.

Without extra compensation or rank, DiLuzio dutifully supervised the department's growing EMS program. Additionally, as SFFD's only EMT-instructor, he provided all medical training--before long, nearly every firefighter became an EMT. In 1985, the department provided a third manned ambulance.

In 1989 Frank DiLuzio helped initiate a major restructuring effort: each ambulance became a full time ALS unit, while every engine was equipped to the BLS level. For the first time a paramedic responded on every call while

advanced calls received a minimum of four medics. In the same year, DiLuzio acquired federal grants, which he used toward the purchase of two new ambulances. He also arranged for the purchase of two new rescue vehicles, two new sets of Hurst tools, two new cardiac monitors and Hepatitis-B vaccinations for all the city's firefighters.

The following are additional accomplishments that can be directly attributed to Frank DiLuzio's untiring efforts.

~~**Dispatch:** Since 1987, DiLuzio has supervised communications. In that time our dispatch system has improved dramatically, becoming faster, more accurate, and better equipped.

~~**Equipment:** Not long ago it used to take an act of Congress to obtain a box of bandaids. Now, all the ambulances, including the reserve units, are fully stocked. Equipment and maintenance problems are efficiently remedied and supplies made readily available. Additionally, we continually receive new and updated equipment.

~~**Publications:** Diluzio has produced a thorough departmental EMS manual, designed new dispatch protocols, and placed a large role in the production of the city's disaster plans. He constantly provides information on the latest EMS training and techniques.

~~**Finance:** By improving documentation DiLuzio has achieved an improved return on service billing. He has also succeeded in tapping money from outside sources.

~~**Public Service:** Diluzio has spread his training throughout the EMS community. He has also established public service and education programs and currently sits on the state PERA board.

~~**Quality Assurance:** Diluzio has implemented a quality assurance program by which all documentation receives thorough review. Problems are detected and quickly reconciled.

Frank DiLuzio's greatest success lies in the area of training. Since 1987, all but two firefighters have become EMTs. The number of EMT-Is has increased, the number of EMT-instructors has gone from one to five, and the the number of paramedics has nearly doubled. Every firefighter receives monthly 3 hour BLS training and each paramedic receives ALS training on a bimonthly basis. For the first time, department medics have been sent to national EMS programs.

Chief Diluzio continues to pursue excellence, preaching: "If you don't change, you die!" This year, we received our first Lifepack 10 and plan to purchase two more before the year's end. Diluzio has also purchased yet

another new ambulance, and plans to provide Santa Fe with its fourth manned ALS unit. Additionally, DiLuzio is applying for a special skills program that will place automatic defibrillators on each of the department's engines.

Frank DiLuzio's tremendous leadership and organizational abilities have brought him rapid promotions. First, to lieutenant (shift commander), then to Captain in charge on EMS (1987), then to Division Chief (1989), and in March of this year he was appointed Deputy Chief in charge of operations--the SFFD's second highest rank. This was most recently demonstrated by the fact that the city's number of cardiac saves more than tripled between 1988 and 1989.

As a child I took pride in knowing that my dad worked for the fire department. Some of my earliest memories of my dad are tied to the roles he filled at the fire department. I have great interest in this historical figure who had great accomplishments in Santa Fe, New Mexico and elsewhere in the world, and should be recognize as an important figure in the Santa Fe historical records. This would be a great way to remind people of his significance to our wonderful city.

Although Wallace became governor of the New Mexico Territory and U.S. minister to Turkey, he achieved his greatest fame before his death on February 15, 1905, as the best-selling author of the novel Ben-Hur: A Tale of the Christ, published in 1880.

Territorial governor of New Mexico 1878 to 1881 [Edit](#)

Wallace arrived in Santa Fe on September 29, 1878, to begin his service as governor of the New Mexico Territory during a time of lawless violence and political corruption. Wallace was involved in

efforts to resolve New Mexico's Lincoln County War, a contentious and violent disagreement among the county's residents, and tried to end a series of Apache raids on territorial settlers. In 1880, while living at the Palace of the Governors in Santa Fe, Wallace also completed the manuscript for "Ben Hur: A Tale of the Christ".

On March 1, 1879, after previous efforts to restore order in Lincoln County had failed, Wallace ordered the arrest of those responsible for local killings. One of the outlaws was William Henry McCarty Jr. (alias William H. Bonney), better known as Billy the Kid. On March 17, 1879, Wallace secretly met with Bonney at the Palace of the Governors in Santa Fe, who had witnessed the murder of a Lincoln County lawyer named Huston Chapman. Wallace wanted him to testify in the trial of Chapman's accused murderers, but Bonney wanted Wallace's protection from his enemies and amnesty for his earlier crimes. During their meeting, the pair arranged for Bonney to become an informant in exchange for a full pardon of his previous crimes. Wallace supposedly assured the Kid that he would be "scot free with a pardon in your pocket for all your misdeeds." On March 20 Bonney agreed to provide grand jury testimony against those involved in Chapman's murder. Wallace arranged for a "fake" arrest and Bonney's detention in a local jail to assure his safety. Bonney testified in court on April 14, as agreed. However, the local district attorney revoked Wallace's bargain. In the meantime, Wallace had resigned from his duties as territorial governor on March 9, 1881, and was waiting for a new political appointment.

Wallace wrote the manuscript for *Ben-Hur*, his second and best-known novel, during his spare time at Crawfordsville, and completed it in Santa Fe, while serving as the territorial governor of New Mexico. In 1900, *Ben-Hur* became the best-selling American novel of the 19th century.

On May 19, 1881, Wallace was appointed U.S. Minister to the Ottoman Empire in Constantinople (present-day Istanbul, Turkey). Wallace remained at the diplomatic post until 1885. Mr. Wallace died in his home state of Indiana in 1905.

Bodybuilder, SFPD bicycle officer often patrolled the Plaza

It always seemed as if everyone in Santa Fe was familiar with Cicilio Sena, the bodybuilding bicycle cop who was known for patrolling the Plaza for the Santa Fe Police Department. His son, Richard Owens Sena Stroble, recalled how people would come up to Sena on the street, just to say hello. "Everyone just loved my dad," Sena Stroble said in an interview. "I felt like my dad was a celebrity when I'd go around with him; it was amazing and almost annoying at the same time ... but it was very heartfelt."

Sena, 68, died late Sunday night or early Monday morning. The family does not yet know the cause.

Those who knew Sena remember him as a loving man who was committed to his community. And those who worked with him often thought of him as a role model, appreciating his ability to connect with people. "When we think of an ambassador for the department with our community, Cicil was it," Deputy Police Chief Ben Valdez said. "He maintained a great rapport with our local businesses and he was just a great example of someone that was welcoming and helpful for people that would come visit Santa Fe."

Sena was born Sept. 25, 1954, in Las Vegas, N.M. He attended West Las Vegas High School, where he was a pole vaulting champion. Not long after finishing school, he enlisted in the Navy, serving from 1974-77. Sena Stroble said somewhere along the line, his father started his lifelong bodybuilding hobby. "He went into the Navy skinny and came back home to visit one time, and he had no neck anymore. He was just ripped," Sena Stroble said.

After his military service, Sena decided to return home to serve his community as a police officer. He earned his police officer's certification in 1983 and started his career at the Las Vegas Police Department. In 1987, he joined Santa Fe police, and worked in the department until retiring in 2008.

During his time on the force, Sena became an iconic part of downtown Santa Fe. As one of the founding members of the department's bike team in the '90s, he was often seen riding the beat — keeping an eye out for those who might need help. Many noted Sena always seemed to treat everyone like a member of the family, referring to the younger folks as *hito* or *hita*, a term of endearment that means son or daughter. And just like a father, it wasn't uncommon to see him scolding them when they got into trouble.

Claudia Urioste said she sometimes was one of those teens getting lectured on the Plaza, often being told to head back to school. "He and my dad were great friends, and I remember many times getting a call that I better not be cruising around downtown and I better not have anyone with me and get back to class, because Cicil was always looking out," Urioste recalled. Valdez said he knew about Sena as a teenager, but never officially met him until he joined the force in 2005.

"For the longest time I didn't know his last name, because when he introduced himself to you, he would say, 'Hello, my name is Cicil.' ... I don't think anyone really formally called him Officer Sena, but you know, that's just kind of a testament to the type of person that he was," Valdez said.

Sena Strobie said his dad would always take him fishing in the Pecos River and Sena's sister, Chepa Sena, recalled how he would cook food for all his friends. "He loved making enchiladas, and I know he was known for banana bread and his baking," Chepa Sena said. "He was just so loving and kind, you know."

Sena is survived by two sons, Sena Strobie and Estefan Sena; two grandchildren, Julian and Nova Kai Sena; his three sisters, Ana Martinez, Chepa Sena and Marcella Canone; and three brothers, Nick, Donato and Robert Sena. He was preceded in death by an older brother, Leroy Sena.

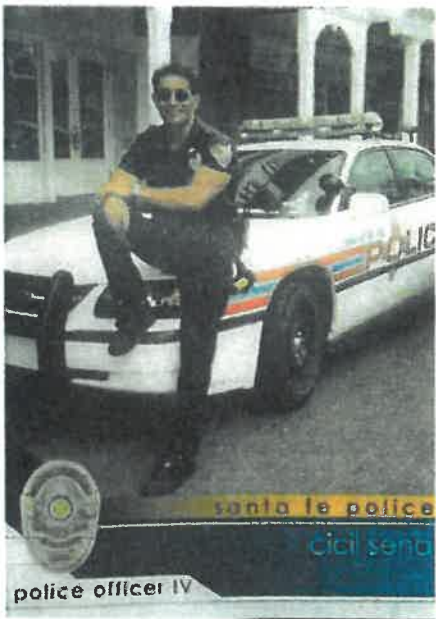

Reasoning:

The purpose of this letter is to nominate Wendy Wagner, NREMT-P (deceased) for the naming of Station 7 in Santa Fe, NM. Wendy meets and/or exceeds the criteria listed in the July 25th, 2023 Santa Fe New Mexican.

As you will see in other nomination letters, Wendy Wagner was one of the first female firefighters in Santa Fe (1985) for 12 years. Wendy became a Nationally Registered Paramedic and this is the part of Wendy's career that I would like to focus on.

Wendy was kind and welcoming to everyone that she came in contact with, whether it was as a firefighter//paramedic or her other profession as a Veterinarian Technician at Ark Clinic. She would take new recruits to Abiquiu Lake and indoctrinate them into the wild and crazy world of pre-hospital medicine. Wendy was instrumental in helping women in the field and would explain to them that some were not yet accepting of female partners and at times would make things difficult for them. I personally talked to Wendy about some of my male partners while at Albuquerque Ambulance and she was very supportive of how to deal with comments related to the fact that we were taking jobs from men and that we showed too much emotion.

Unless one has ever been in that position, one has not a clue how empowering it is for someone to listen and save space for you. Things are so different today for young females because of leaders like Wendy Wagner. I was working at the EMS Bureau on that fatal day when Wendy was shot and killed during a truck jacking near Glorietta, NM. Our office was turned into a Command Post for state police and we were kept apprised of the incident until Wendy's body was recovered in Kansas. When her big red dually truck was driven through Santa Fe on the back of a flat bed trailer, a piece of my heart and soul died right along with her.

It is hard to believe that Wendy's death was 26 years ago – July 28th, 1997. Wendy was so involved in many facets of public service ranging from fire and ems to animals at the vet clinic to women at Esperanza receiving services for domestic violence. Wendy not only worked with the abused women, she also treated their animals that were on several occasions brought to the shelter. She was one of the kindest and compassionate women that I ever had the pleasure of meeting and working with.

Please give Wendy Wagner your most serious consideration for naming Station 7. I am aware that you will be receiving many deserving nominations and I support the decision that will come from the City Council. Thank you in advance for all you do to serve this amazing state.

From 1989 to 1995, I was the EMS Region I Training Coordinator working in the N.M. Dept. of Public Health at the Harold Runnels Building in Santa Fe. Because of our location and involvement with Emergency Medical Services, we were in close contact with all the Fire Departments throughout New Mexico and the Navajo Reservation, but particularly the Santa Fe Fire Dept. It was in this context that I met and came to admire Santa Fe Firefighter/Paramedic **Wendy Wagner**.

Starting in 1985, Wendy was one of the few women firefighters in New Mexico. In those days, women were often subjected to harassment, condescension, discrimination, and fire house "humor". Being a paramedic is a tough job since you are constantly called to attend to the sick and injured and to care for folks who are often economically disadvantaged and frequently victims of violence and abuse. At worst, the street is a hostile workplace; at best, it is just plain difficult.

Wendy managed to stay physically and psychologically healthy. For women, one of the sources of friction with male firefighters was lifting all sizes of people on stretchers and heavy life saving / firefighting equipment. Wendy took the initiative to do strength and conditioning at the gym and at home. She was also a role model and source of psychological strength for other female First Responders in similar situations and would help them adjust to and confront the prejudices, hostility and stressful situations they encountered.

In addition to her Firefighter/Paramedic duties, Wendy was a Veterinary Technician. When she encountered those who needed shelter from domestic abuse, she would make sure that both they and their animals were sheltered. Wendy cared, as do a lot of people, but she was different because she stood up and intervened to make things better for everyone, every day.

Wendy was murdered when an armed thief stole her truck. It was not a line-of-duty death. It was tragic because she became a victim of the violence she detested. She fought back rather than being a passive victim of a thief and her murderer.

I can think of no one more deserving of the honor of having a Fire Station named for her than **Wendy Wagner**. She loved and served Santa Fe. It is fitting that Santa Fe honor her example and her memory.

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Chief Moya:

My brother Jeff and I would like the Committee to consider naming the new Fire Station after my father Tom K Broome II. Public service was part of my father's DNA. Growing up watching dad's work ethic and passion for service, without a doubt, had an influence on us. In so many ways he was far ahead of his time and accomplished so much in his short life.

Our father, Tom K. Broome Jr. was born in Santa Fe, and he grew up on Gregory Lane and at the Ranch in Pecos. At that time, my grandfather Tom Broome Sr. had both the furniture store on Palace Ave. and operated a Dude Ranch in Pecos. Dad and his brother George grew up riding horses, taking guests into the wilderness on pack trips, and day working at local cattle ranches. The majority of the Ranch was sold to the Monastery, but the family kept a few acres with three cabins where we later spent our summers.

Shortly after graduating high school from the New Mexico Military Institute, Dad found himself president of T.K. Broome Inc. after his father died unexpectedly at 50- years old. Having so much responsibility heaved on him at such a young age really shaped his work ethic, in a sense preparing him for what was to come.

Dad was a member of the New Mexico Mounted Patrol; At that time, it was pretty much a Reserve unit for the New Mexico State Police. Dad searched for lost people in the wilderness, worked roadblocks looking for fugitives and directed traffic at the Rodeo, mostly all horseback, much of it on his great horse "Noche". Later he and my mother bought a Sorrell colored (red) roping horse named "Fireman Bill." We always had horses; My dad roped steers at a Ranch outside Santa Fe. Dad's influence on our families continues today. My brother Jeff and I learned to rope and rodeo at a young age. We both rode Noche and Bill through High School. We both still have horses today.

After a fire at the furniture store Warehouse, Dad discovered that his true calling was being a Firefighter. At 26- years old, Dad joined the Santa Fe Volunteer Fire Department, where he

quickly rose through the ranks becoming Capitan in charge of training, then Assistant Chief and finally the Volunteer Chief when he was 33 years old. Dad lived and breathed the Fire Department. He took every training course he could find, and he read and studied Fire Science constantly. Many of our vacations were at a motel in Las Cruces, swimming all day, while Dad attended Fire School. My Dad worked six or seven days a week as long as I can remember. I really don't know how he balanced it all, but he managed to be a great Dad as well. He would try to include us when he could at the department. My brother and I rolled a lot of hose over the years. I recall that Dad made what he called a "Christmas Tree" out of gas pipe, which he hauled in one of the furniture delivery trucks to different parking lots in the city, where the Volunteers put on Fire Fighting Demonstrations, using the propane fired tree.

When the City of Santa Fe was moving towards a paid Department, Dad was hired as the part-time Fire Administrator. Dad would work half a day at the store and half day at the fire department. When the City moved to make the fire chief position a paid city position, the job was offered to Dad. I remember him saying that if he would only take the job if he was elected by the volunteers also, which he was. He also called us all together and asked for our input. I think we all agreed the Fire Department is where Dad belonged. Shortly thereafter the City made the move towards dissolving the volunteers and establishing an all-paid Department. My Dad and Mother sold the business, and Dad was all in.

I know this was a somewhat difficult transition but I can't imagine anyone better prepared for the job. Dad had the respect of both the City leaders and the volunteers. Because of Dad's business background he understood budgets and spent the taxpayers money responsibly. He knew every part of the job. He designed, drove and even worked on the firetrucks. I can't remember how many he personally drove to Santa Fe from the factories back east, and sometimes my mother went with him; One time my brother and I rode back on a pumper from Florida to Santa Fe.

At one point the local ambulance company gave short notice that they were no longer going to provide ambulance service to the City of Santa Fe. I remember Dad borrowed a couple of ambulances from Albuquerque, and the Fire Ambulance Service was born. From scratch, EMTs and Paramedics had to be hired, trained and equipped. I often heard my dad talk about these difficulties, but I really don't recall him griping about them. A problem would occur, and Dad would just handle it. I guess I can only remember one thing he couldn't fix and that was the Cancer that took him so sudden. I am still today taken back at the bravery he showed throughout his illness. He missed hardly any work. When Dad was going through the chemo treatments, he would check into the hospital on Friday afternoon, and be back at work on Monday. In fact, Dad worked on Friday, had surgery on Monday, which was unsuccessful and passed that Monday.

Dad's bravery wasn't really a surprise to those who knew him. When the riots broke out at the Prison in February of 1980, Dad was there with a small group of Firefighters, who fought the fires until pushed back by the inmates. There was no way my father would send someone else to do such a dangerous job that he wasn't willing to do himself. Or when the report of a fire at the Highway Department Building came out, Dad was the first one there evacuating the building, where he did eat some smoke. It was later learned that the cause of the fire was a fire in the PCB filled transformer in the basement of the building, which sat vacant for many years afterwards. A few months after the incident, Dad was diagnosed with Lung Cancer, and he never smoked a day in his life.

I don't know anyone who was more honest than Dad. He never did anything that he did not believe in. When Dad started a program to actively recruit female Firefighters in the 80's, it was because he believed in the program. My mother and father were a team. When Dad was splitting time between the store and the fire department, my mother, took a large role in the business. In turn it was not unusual to see my dad vacuuming the house, doing dishes, whatever it took to help my mother. I know Dad would be so proud of his granddaughter, a police detective and rodeo cowgirl, who followed in my footsteps, as I followed in my Father's. I know, I know, I went to the dark side joining the police department. Dad and I harassed each other over police vs Fire. In truth, Dad was proud of all of his children, and would have been proud of all his grandchildren. Unfortunately, Dad never knew any of his grandchildren. My daughter was born about a year after he died, and my sister's twins only a few months after he passed.

My Dad loved Santa Fe and he loved the Santa Fe Fire Department. So much of the modernization and day- to day- operations that are likely taken for granted, were born during Chief Tom K. Broome's tenure. He was Fire Chief, both volunteer and paid for nearly 20 years. I think Santa Fe may have had a little more of him that we did. Being a Firefighter was his life, and unfortunately likely led to his early death. Dad never pursued that, and asked my mother not to as well. I think he just felt that it was just the cost of the job. So, in closing I hope you will agree that it is only fitting that Santa Fe honor him with the naming of Station 7. My father would be humbled and his family extremely proud.

Broome is new fire chief

Tom Broome Jr., is Santa Fe's new fire chief. Broome, 33, has been a member of the Santa Fe Fire Department for 6 years. Prior to his election, he served two and one-half years as first assistant chief.

He said he believes Santa Fe has the finest fire fighting organization in the state. "We have an advantage in that we have both paid and volunteer fire fighters," Broome said.

Broome is president of the corporation which operates Broome's of Santa Fe, a furniture store.

Other officers elected in the department include Don Bell, city fire marshal; Polo Sena, inspector of equipment; John Harvey, president of the volun-

John Kearney continues in his position as fire department administrator and training officer. Santa Fe firemen protect an area of about 30 square miles with a population of about 45,000.

Last year firemen acquired two new pumper trucks and opened a new fire station bringing to six the number of stations in service.

The department has seven in service pumpers, two reserve pumpers, a ladder truck, rescue truck, brush truck, a pick-up and two sedans.

Firemen are proud of the new fire training center being built for the department, Broome said. Construction began in November. The first stage, consists of a three-story drill tow-



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public servants with the death this week of Fire Chief Tom Broome.

His death is a loss for the entire community because of the service he provided in building and developing the all-volunteer city department into its present combination of volunteer and paid firefighters. He also helped establish a first-class city emergency ambulance service.

What impressed almost everyone who came in contact with him was his business-like, no nonsense approach to his job. He was always professional regardless of whether he was dealing with the press, his staff, or other public safety agencies such as the police or state fire marshal's office investigators.

He started as a volunteer, rushing out to fight fires from his family's furniture business on Palace Avenue. Firefighting became a life-long fascination for him. He took courses, went to seminars and dedicated his life to learning as much as he could about the job of fighting fires and saving lives.

He broadened himself as much as he could learning about emergency planning, dealing with hazardous materials, emergency medicine and how to conduct in-service training.

The respect for his knowledge and the confidence his staff and city officials had in his leadership grew to the point where when the city needed a full-time, paid fire chief, Broome was the unanimous choice.

He seemed to be the right person at the right time for the job because he was able to bridge the gap between traditional volunteers and paid firefighters. He consistently worked to improve the department's training, equipment and capability.

Broome's goal was always getting the job done, but he never made unreasonable demands. On the fire line, he never asked firefighters to do something he wouldn't do himself. Their safety was always his priority. As a department manager, his recommendations were respected by the City Council because he would ask only for what was needed.

The state fire marshal's office and fire departments around the state would routinely call Broome to seek advice or suggestions on how to deal with public safety problems.

The entire state has lost a vital resource, but Santa Fe has lost one of its best citizens. Tom Broome will be missed. An entire community sends its condolences to his family and friends.
