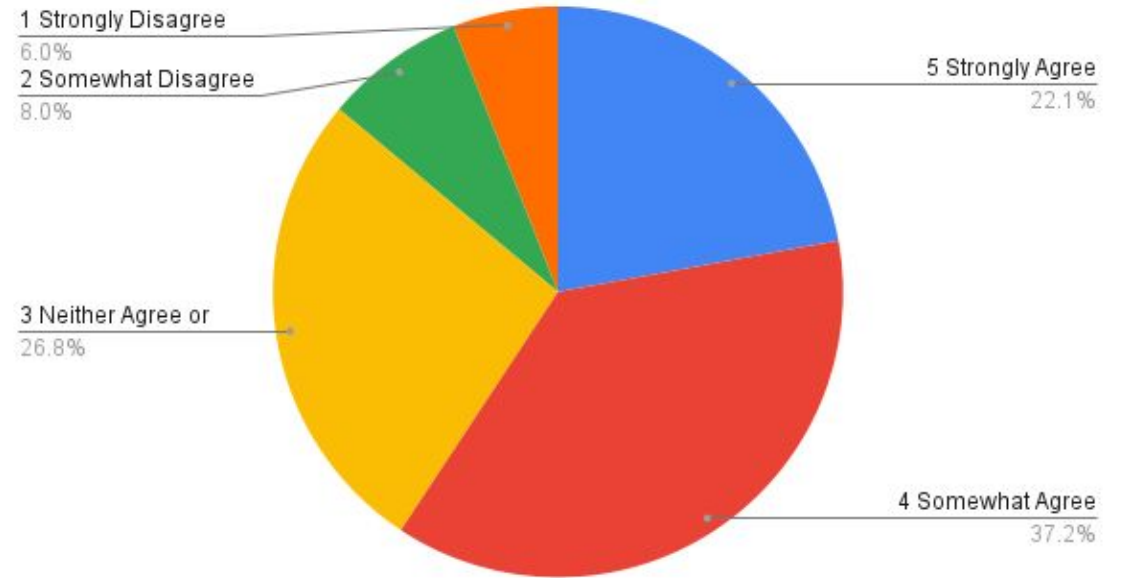

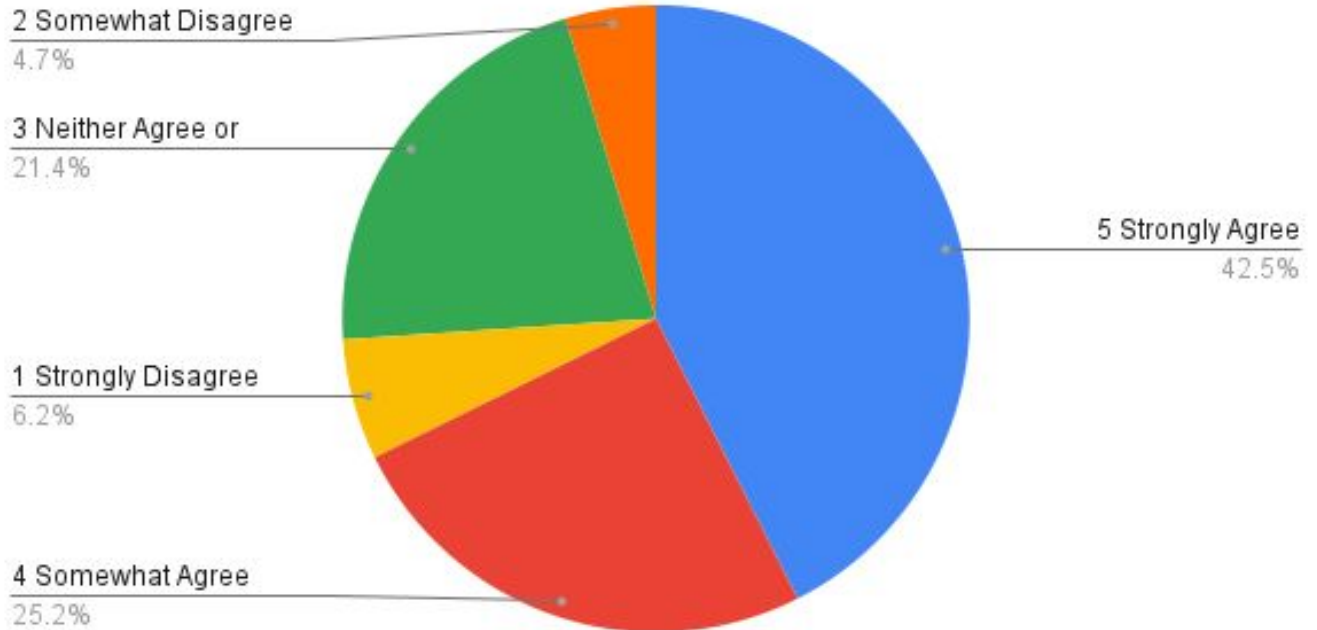




# Program Strengths & Challenges

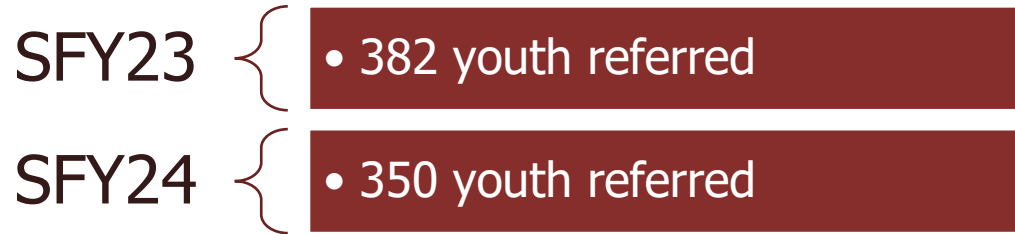
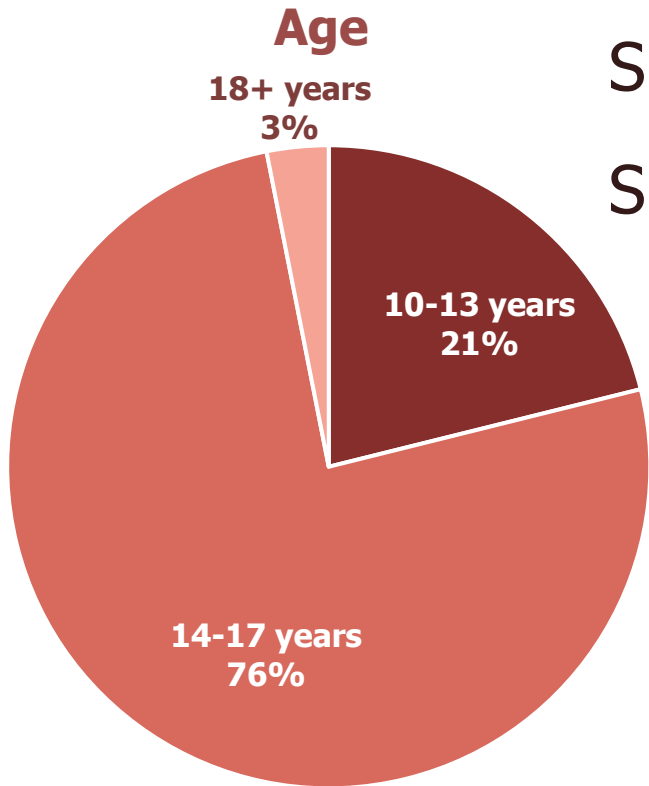

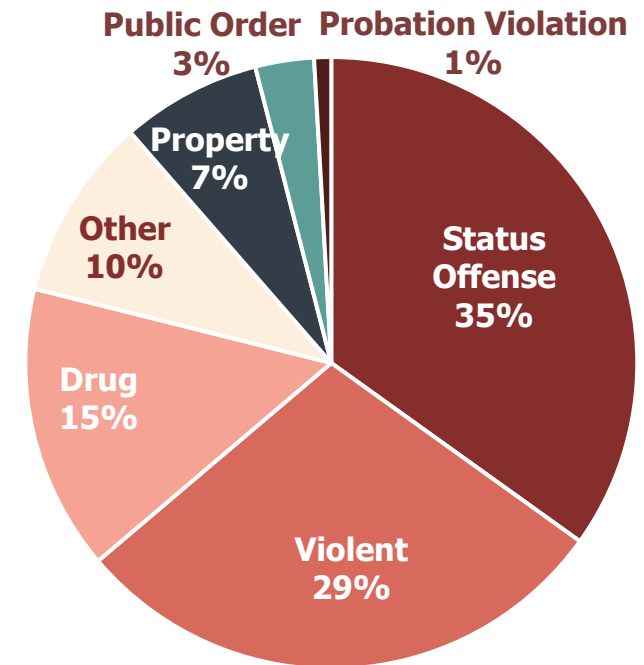

**5%** involved with Juvenile Justice prior to SFY24 referral(s)

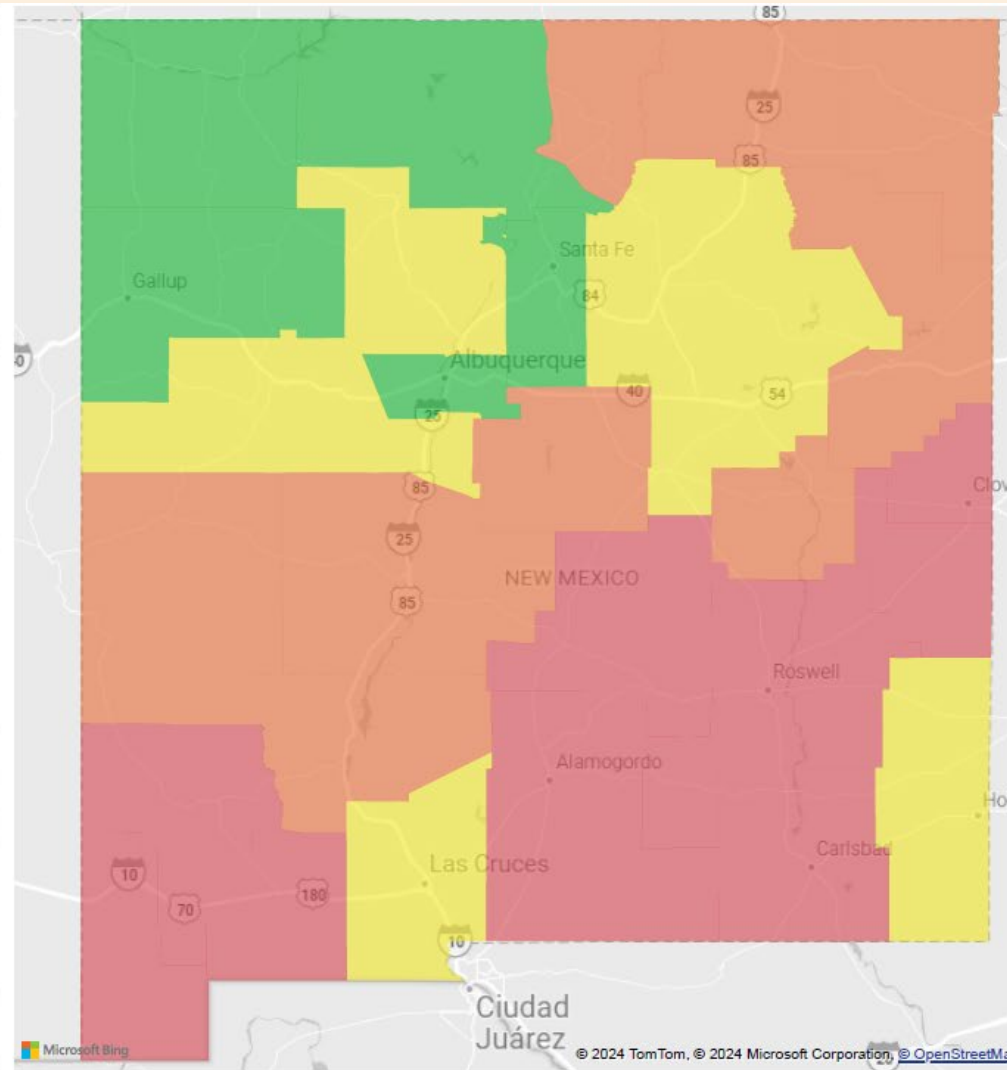
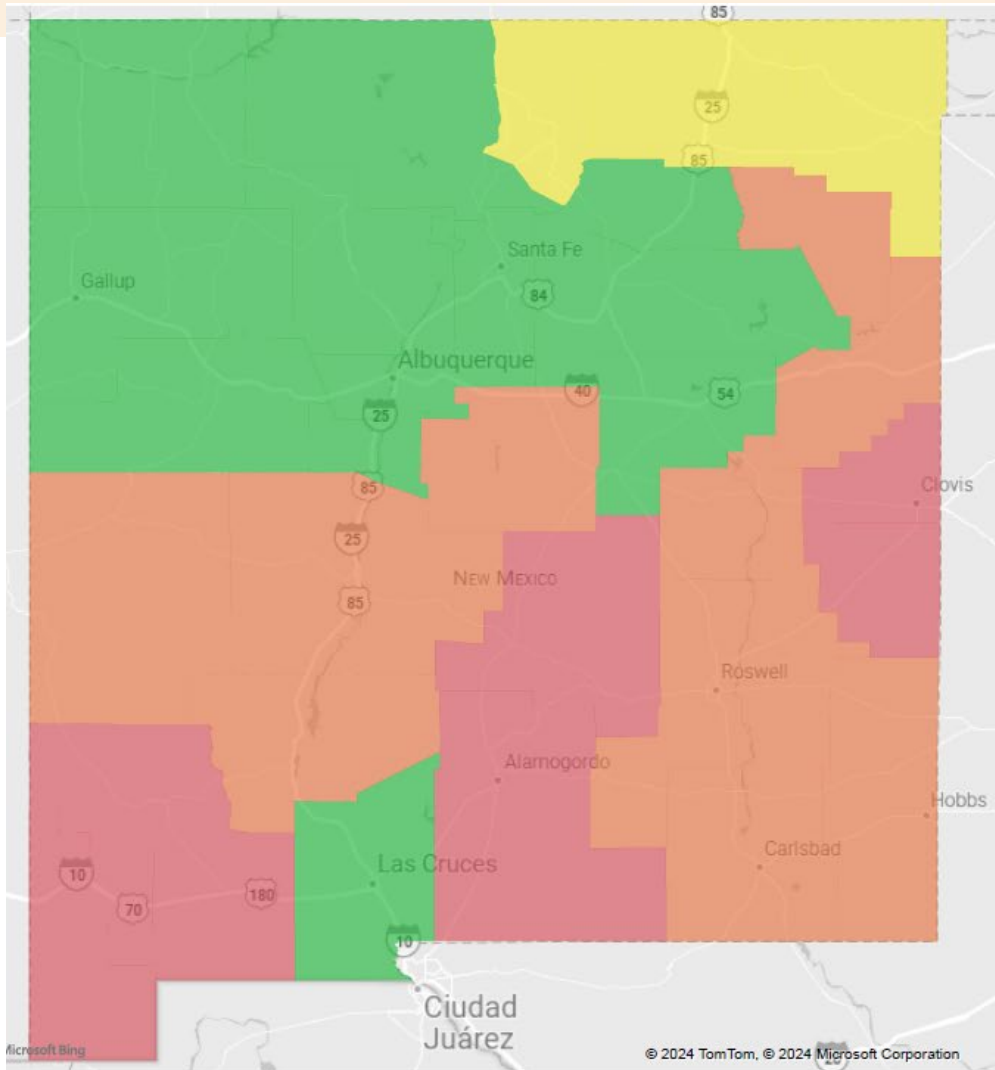

# Referral Rate per 1,000 Population

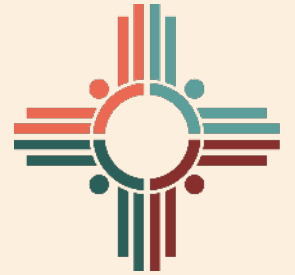

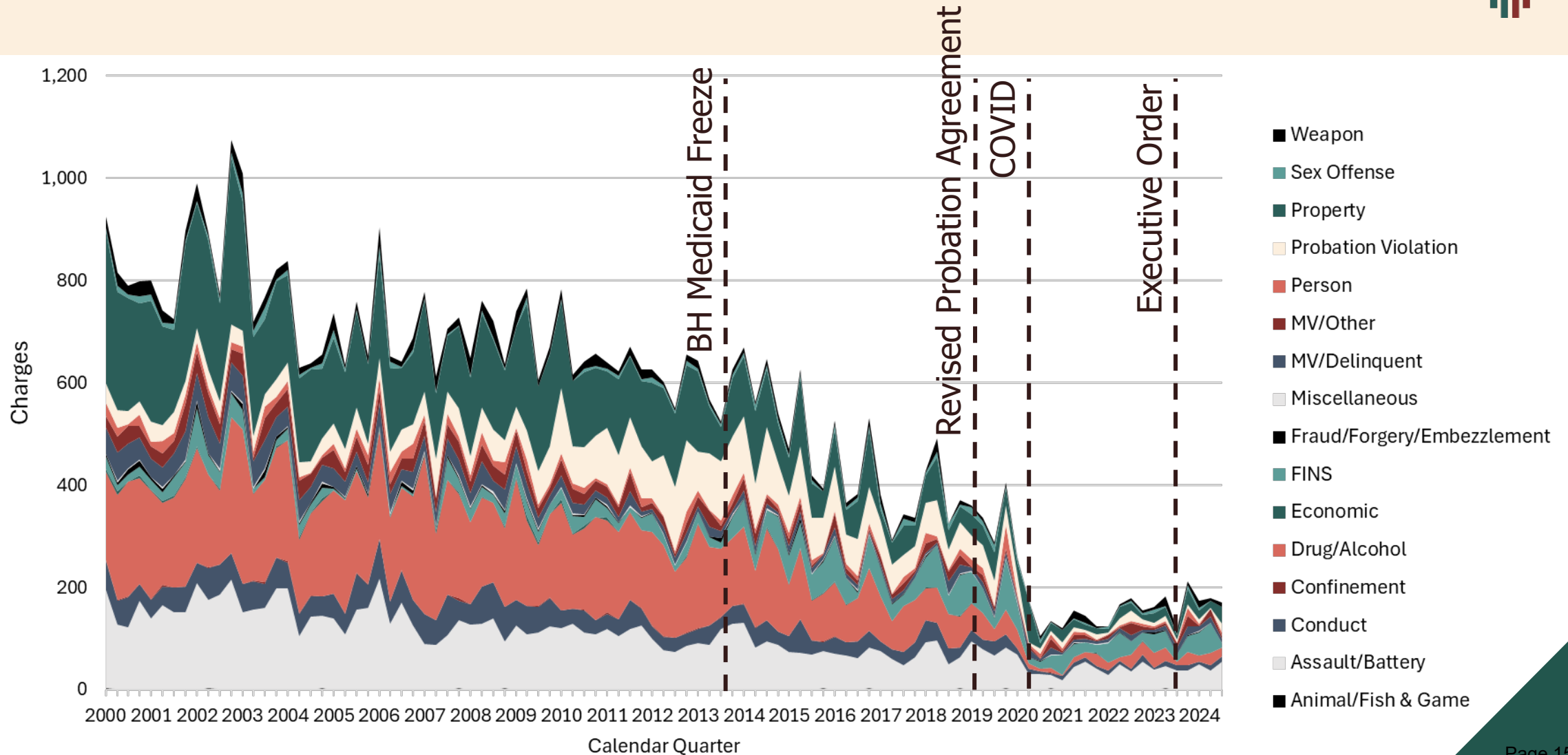
## SFY24 Offenses

- No murder or voluntary manslaughter charges

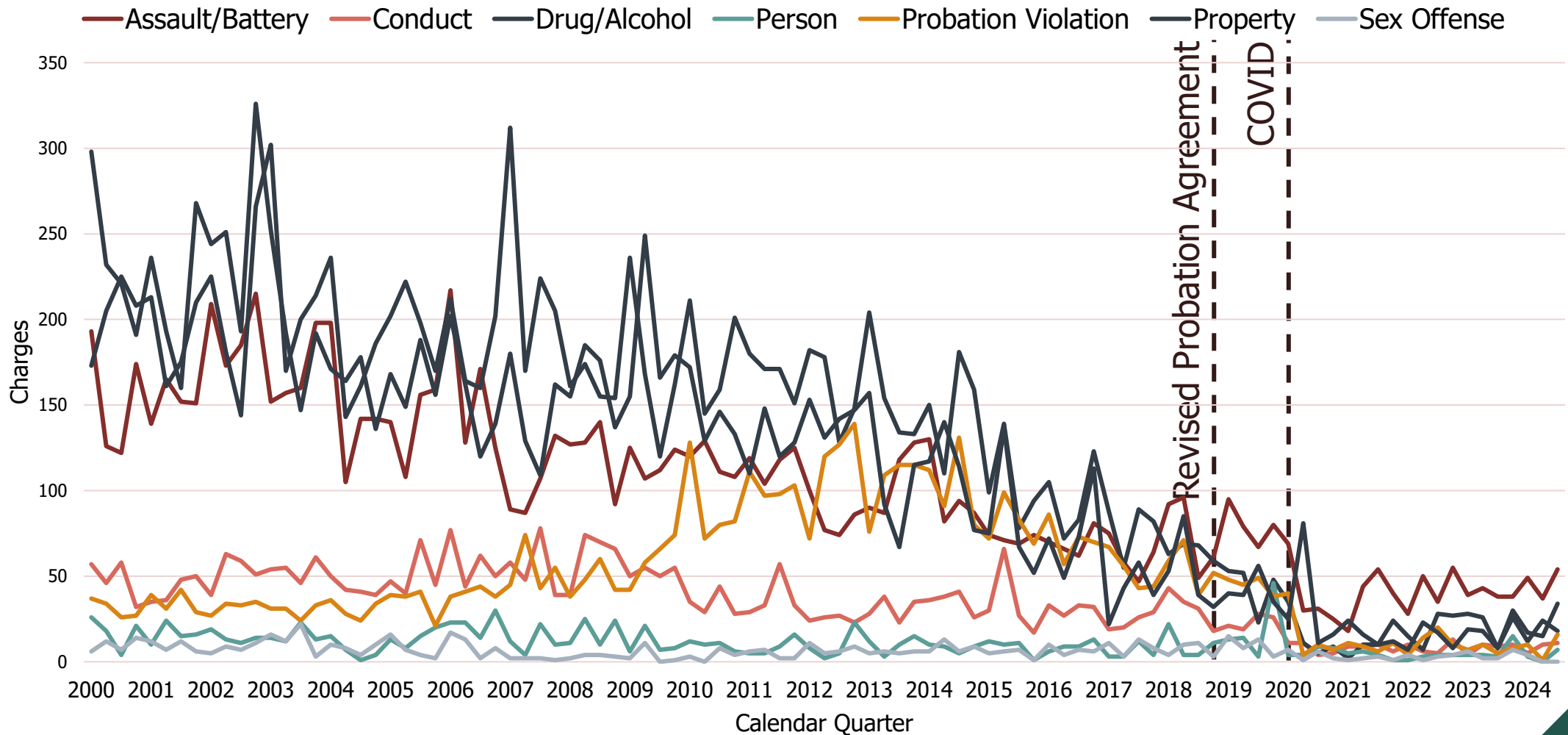

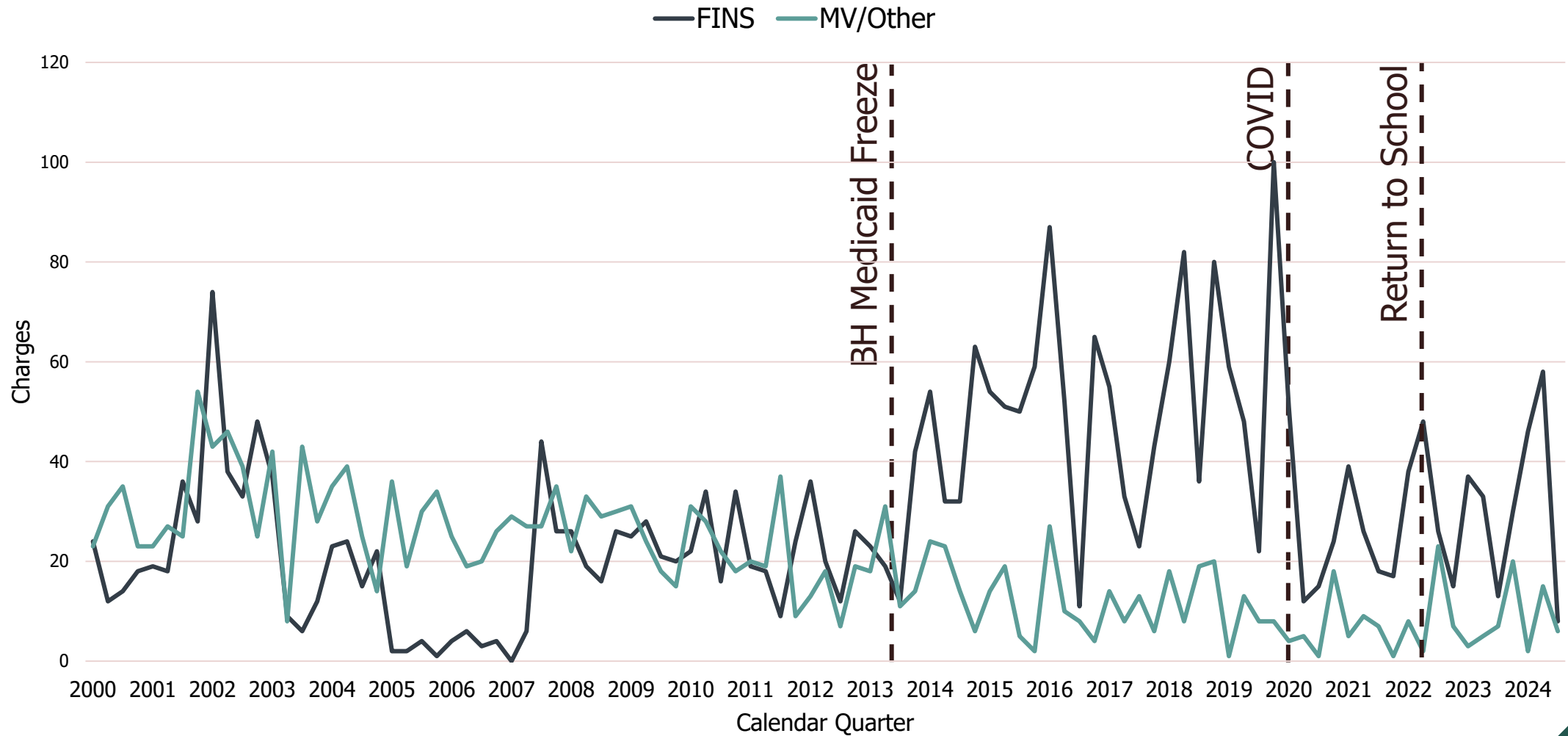

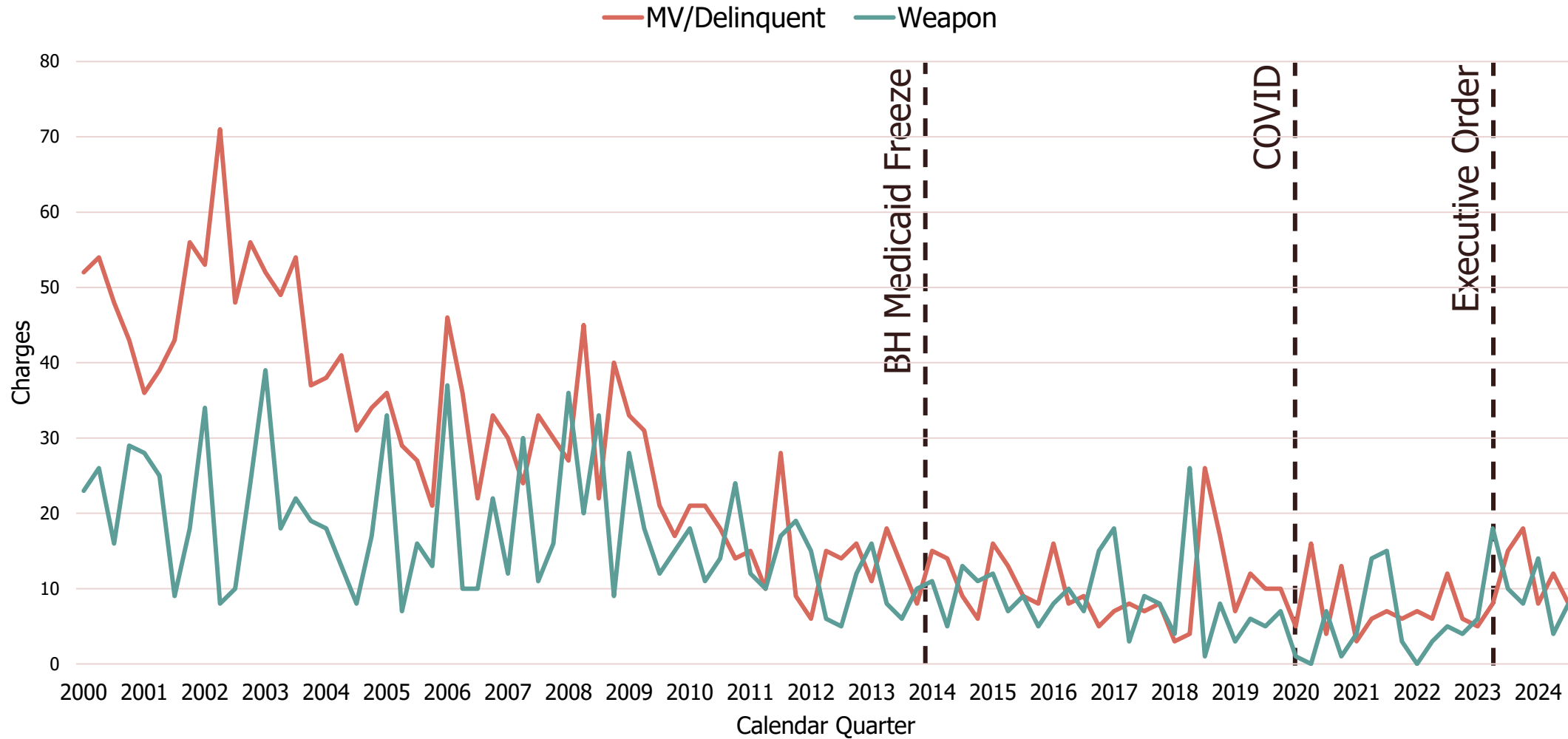
# Decreased Youth Offenses - District 1



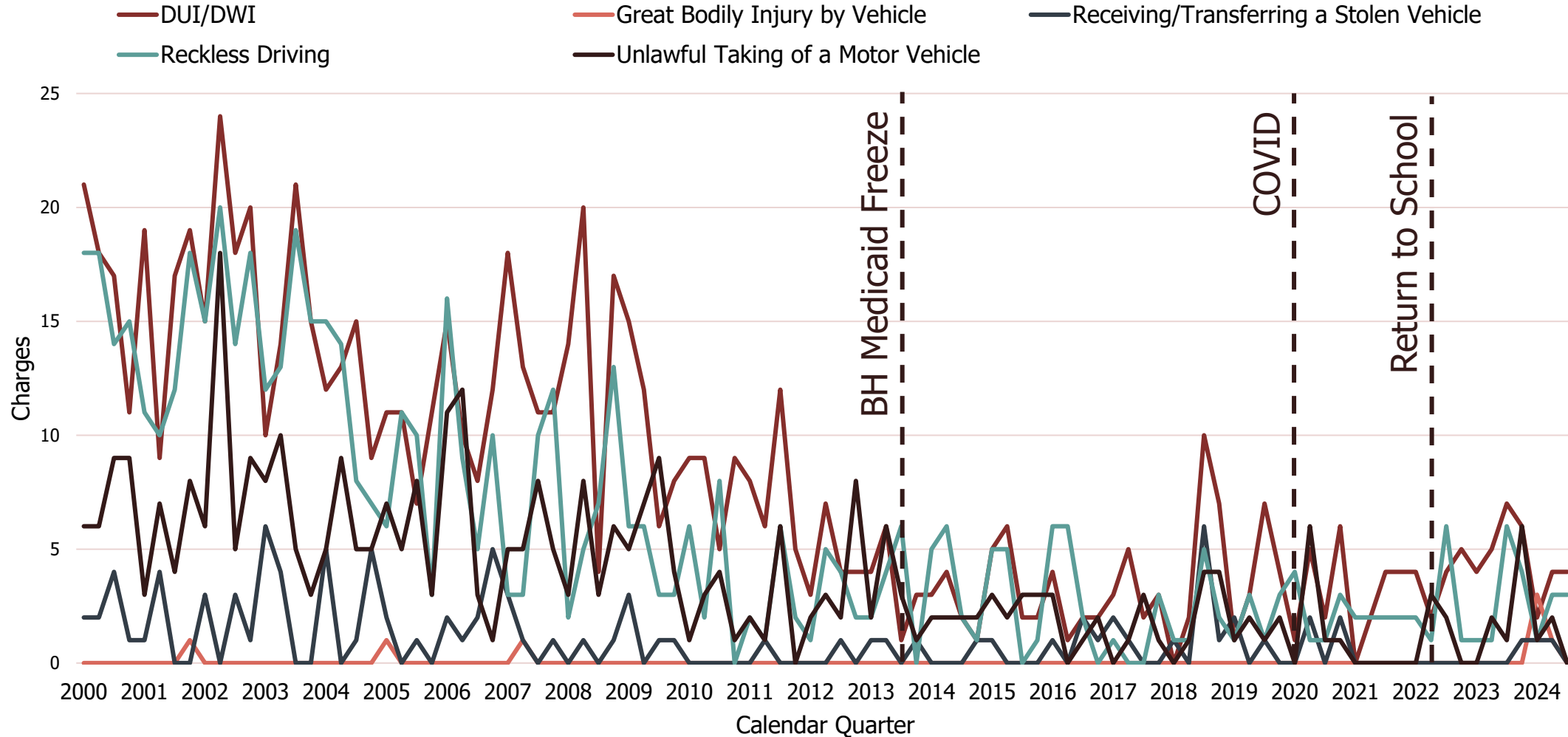
# Maintained Youth Offenses - District 1



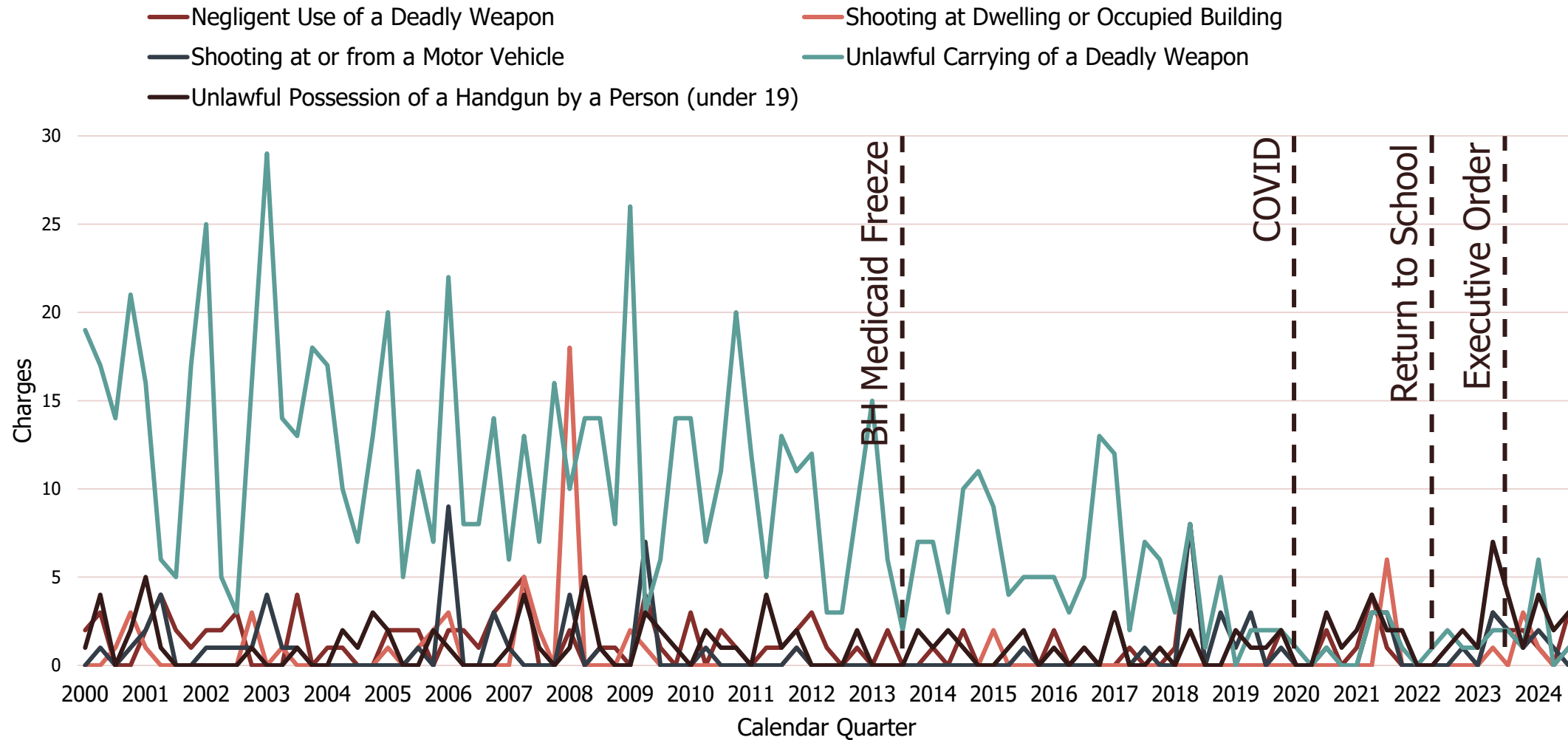
# Increased Youth Offenses - District 1

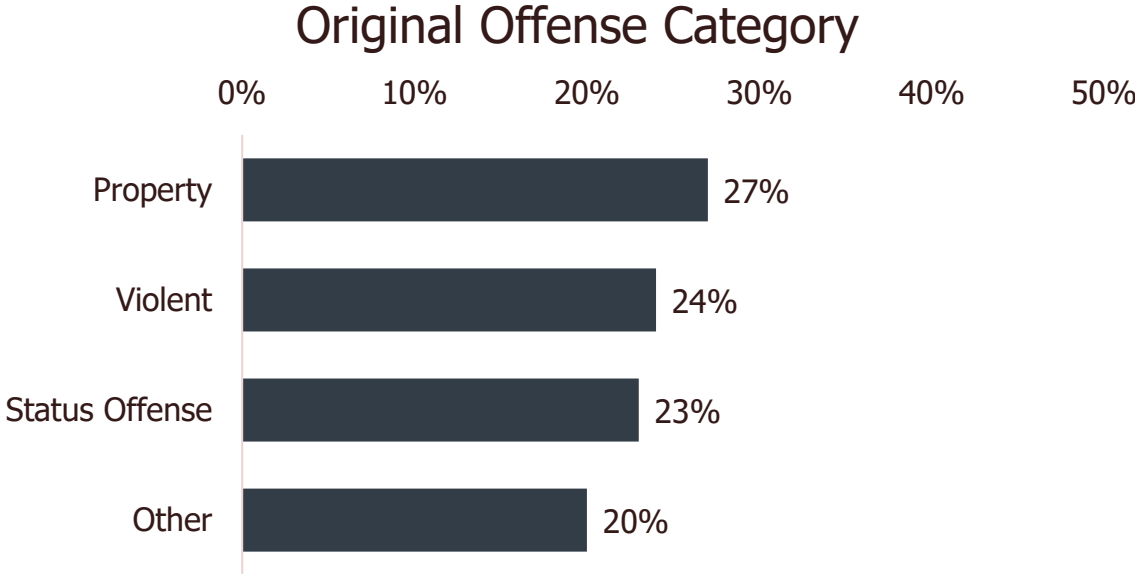

# Two-Year Recidivism – District 1



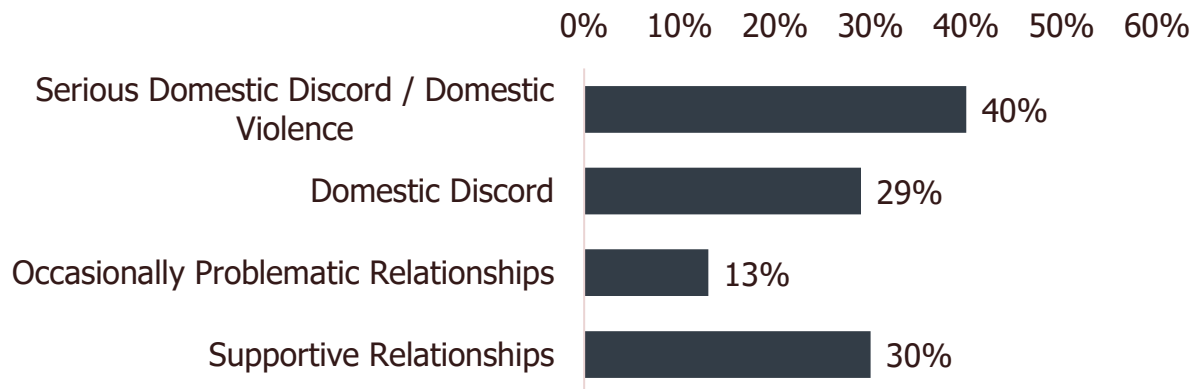

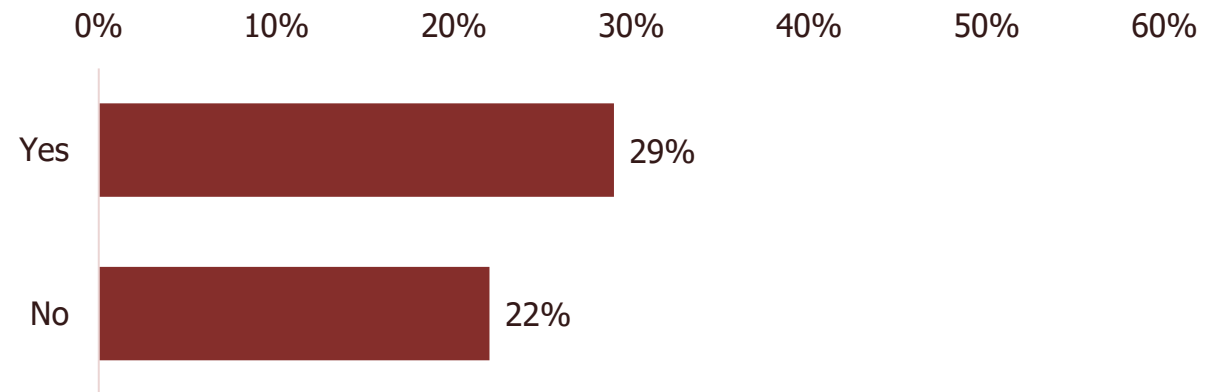
# Two-Year Recidivism after Supervision - District 1



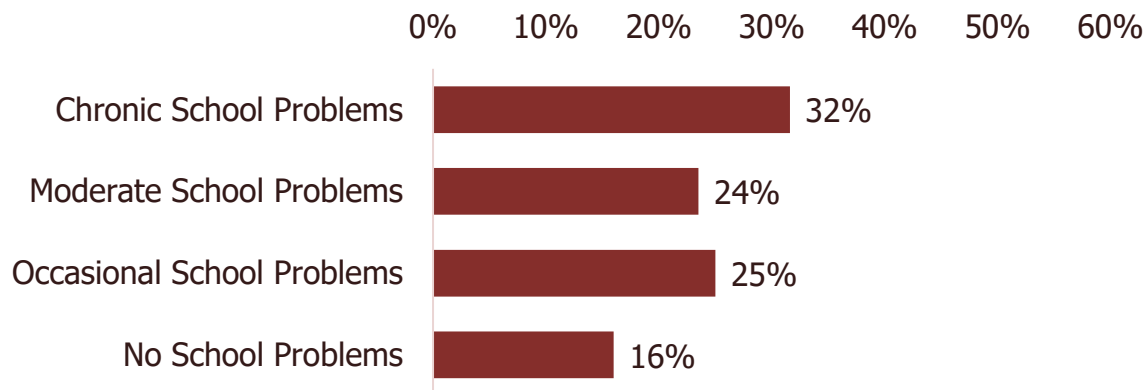

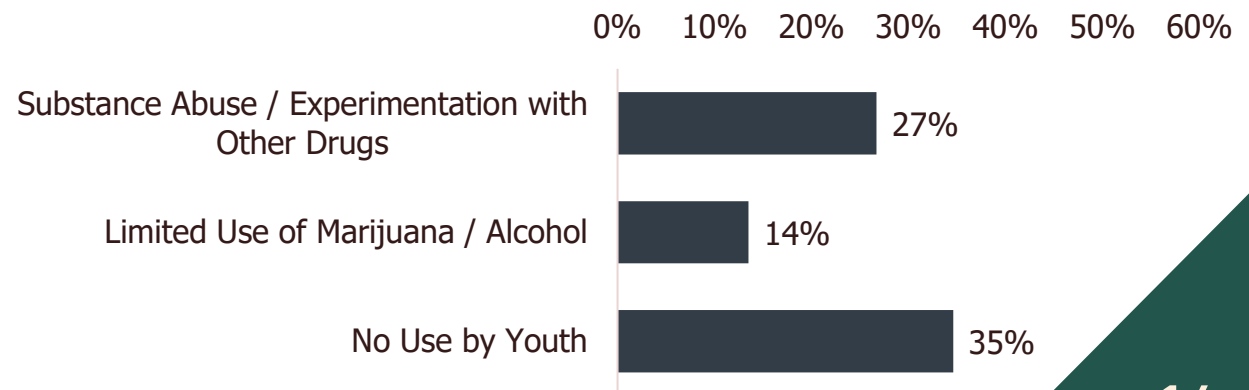

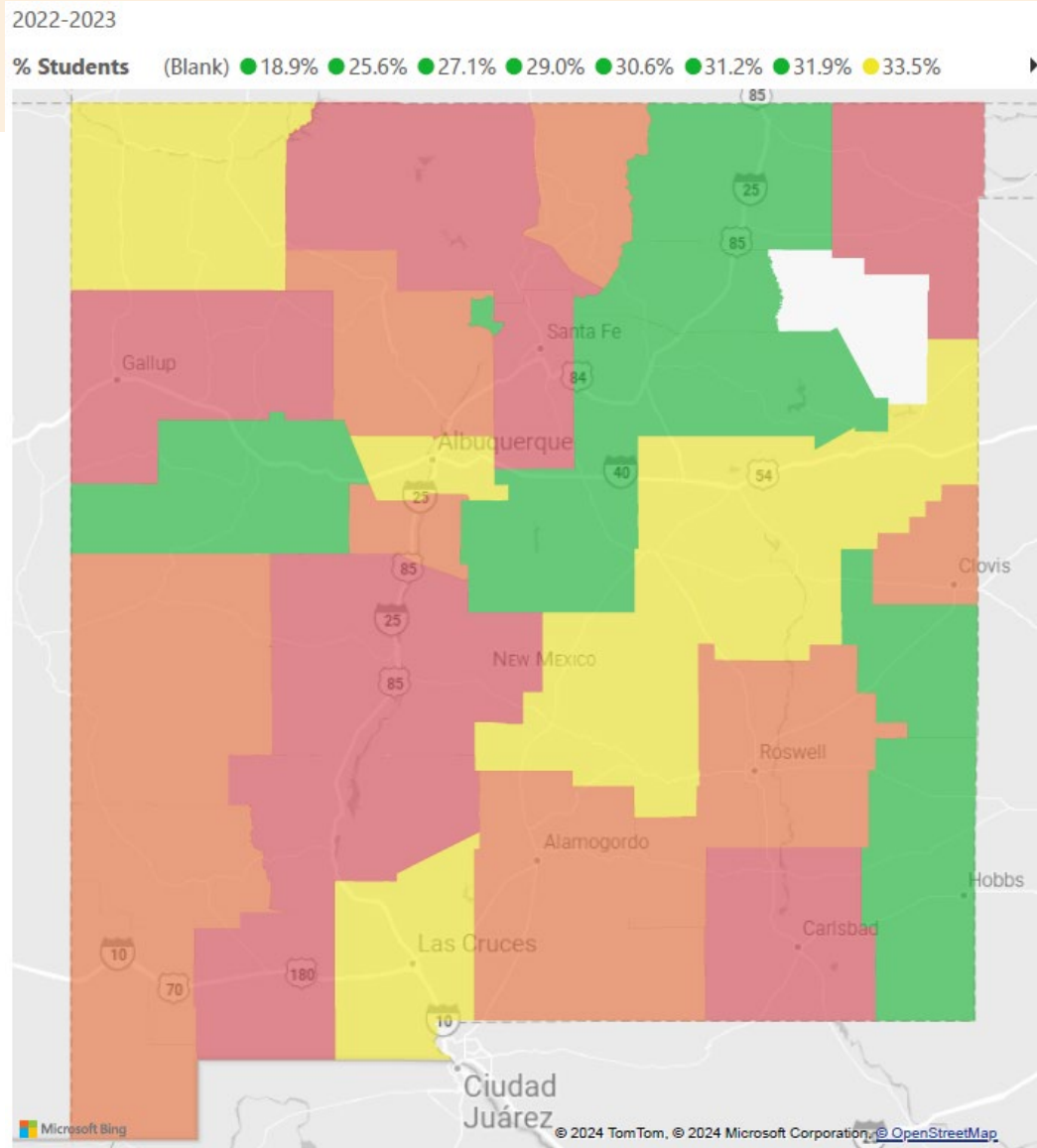

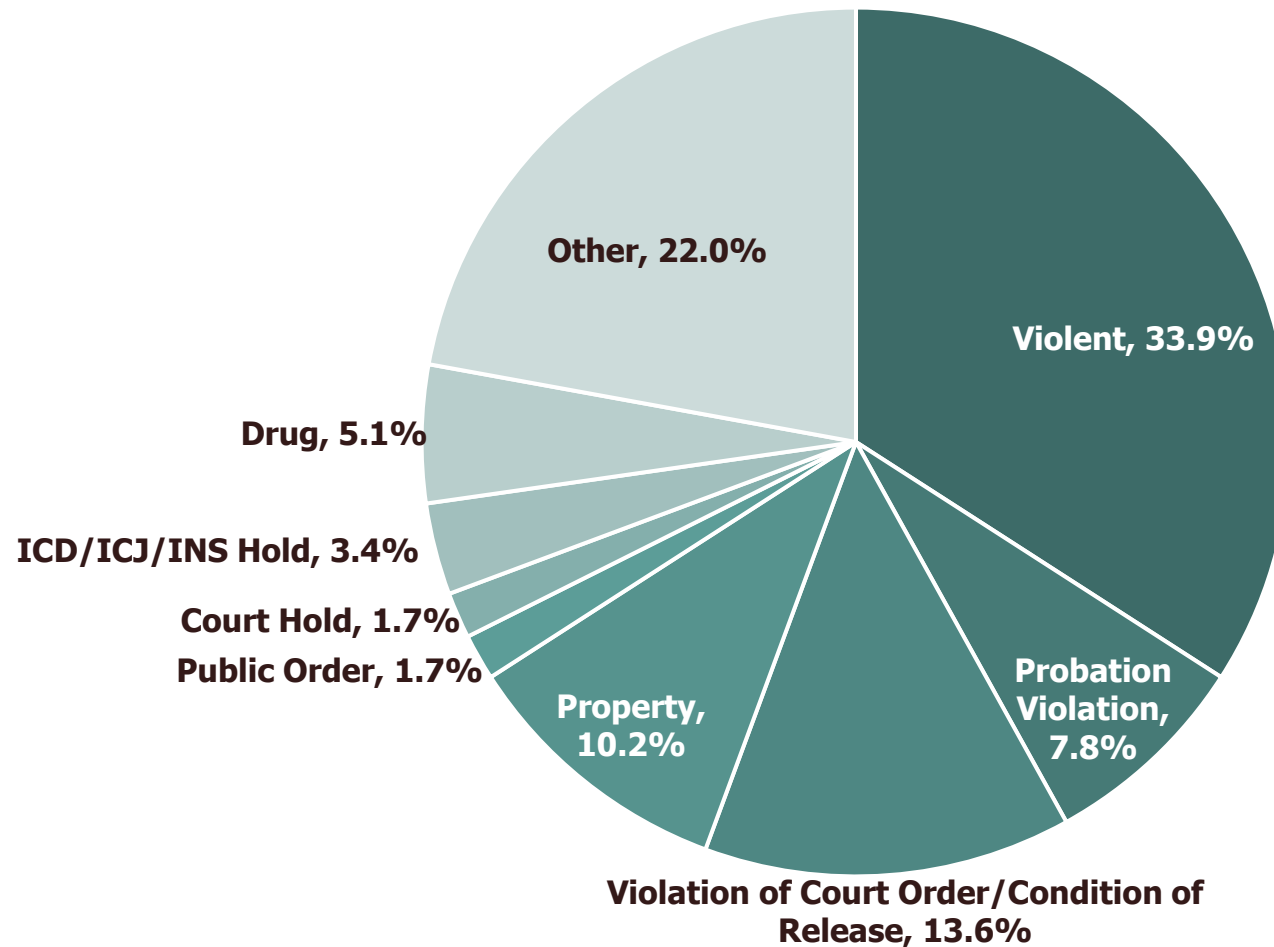
