Nusenda Foundation awards more than \$160k to Northern New Mexico groups, The New Mexican | SFWA received a generous \$15,000 grant from the Nusenda Foundation to fund a series of rain garden and green stormwater infrastructure workshops. "We're really trying to give learners the tools they need to be empowered to be part of the solution," as SFWA Executive Director Mori Hensley told the newspaper. The workshops will roll out in the Spring. The paper also mentioned SFWA's new rain garden STEM-aligned curriculum for Santa Fe high school students.

"A Crucial Watershed Moment," Old Santa Fe Association's ¡El Boletín! | SFWA is also deeply involved with comprehensive and holistic watershed planning. "We as a watershed community have a crucial opportunity to contribute to myriad overlapping regional planning processes underway including the City of Santa Fe Land Development Code update and creation of a new General Plan, County community plan updates, and State Regional Water Planning," as Mori wrote in the article.

SPONSOR AND STEWARD UPDATES

- We are continually assessing recruitment and retention strategies for both sponsors and stewards.
- SFWA just formed a Development Committee that will assist with sponsor cultivation.
- Director of Stewardship and Outreach, Amara May, sends out sponsor invoices and renewal letters and continues approaching potential Sponsors.
- Stewardship and Outreach Coordinator, Lorraine Chow, is tracking Steward renewals, approaching new potential Stewards and "Angel" Volunteers, and encouraging current steward teams to clean their reaches and, occasionally, other reaches in need of a cleanup.

SIGNAGE

- We recently updated all signs and will continue regularly checking signs for wear and tear. Signs are from Cerro Gordo Road to Siler Bridge.
- SFWA is not planning to install new signage in distant and arroyo reaches that don't provide ample visibility.
- We plan to do a full signage redesign and replacement next year.

COORDINATE WITH CITY STAFF TO ENSURE ALIGNMENT WITH GOALS

- SFWA staff met with River and Watershed Manager Zoe Isaacson and Parks staff about trash collection, special events, and cleanups.
- SFWA staff has a meeting planned with Zoe Isaacson and her staff to plan for Love Your Watershed Day 2025.
- Amara May and Lorraine Chow notify Zoe Isaacson about cleanups to schedule trash collection. They also relay observations received from stewards.

MONTHLY EDUCATIONAL OFFERINGS

Provide at a minimum, one monthly training and/or educational opportunity for the volunteers of the program and the community. Provide training and or workshops to educate volunteers on watershed infrastructure issues such as rain garden maintenance, vegetation management (pruning and thinning), invasive species removal; introductions to basic water conservation practices and responsible stormwater management; and issues pertaining to persons who are unhoused such as hazardous waste handling and available resources.

- Upcoming offerings include "What is it Like to be Unhoused?" on Jan. 21, Animal tracking on Feb. 2, and Rooftop to Raingardens workshop in March.
- Ongoing steward workshop topics include The Problem with Dog Poop, Elm Thinning, Litter Auditing, and Simple Erosion Control.
- We started "Trash Talk," an informational campaign letting folks know how to dispose of different kinds of waste.
- During cleanups Amara and Lorraine attend, they speak to the volunteers about water conservation and water challenges in the Southwest.
